We won the Community Spirit Award at the Pride of Brent Youth Awards. This was for our London Citizens work in making our local community in Harlesden safer. Students and their parents joined the Chief Executive, the Mayor of Brent and the Leader of Brent Council at the Pride of Brent Youth Awards on Saturday 20 July 2019 in the Grand Hall at Brent Civic Centre. We had a drinks reception and canapés followed by a buffet lunch. from 2.30pm onwards. The buffet will

We won this award as our London Citizen's group set up the biggest City Safe Haven in London as part of their volunteer work on safety in the local community. Students went out in all weather conditions and in their own time after school to ask local shopkeepers in Harlesden, to join their safe haven. This was challenging as the group had to speak to adults and convince them to join them in making Harlesden a safer area for all the community. In joining the haven shopkeepers were obliged to offer their shop as a safe haven for people fleeing crimes or attacks. This was hard as students were met by verbal aggression when communicating with shopkeepers. However, the group continued their fight and went out asking more and more shops to join. They had meetings and signed up big businesses such as Peacocks, Santander, Holland & Barrett and Game arena. Santander invited the students into the bank to offer training to staff regarding safety in Harlesden. The group also worked alongside the local police in creating a safer community, as well as giving presentations to primary schools. The students created the largest City Safe Haven in London with over 70 shops joining to promote safety in the local community. The group dedicated this haven to the late Daniel Omari Smith an ex student who died tragically.

The London Citizen's group continued their fight for social justice. Students decided to create a lighting campaign as several students from their school were attacked in Roundwood Park on different occasions as they could not see the perpetrators. The surveyed the local community to see if they also wanted lights in Roundwood Park. The local community said they were concerned about this issue and they were frightened to walk through Roundwood Park after dark. The students decided that they must do something about this dilemma for the safety of the community. They organised a Brent assembly which Councillor Butt attended, they presented their findings and pleaded that he light up Roundwood Park. Councillor Butt agreed that there was an issue and said he would "light up Brent". Butt and other members of Brent Council came to NCC to view the Skate Park. The London Citizens group were the first students under 18 to speak to a Brent Council meeting. Recently, they had another meeting at the Brent Civic centre with Councillor Butt and his team regarding lights in park, they confirmed we had a good idea but could not find the funding. They faced many challenges as holding politicians accountable, going into very daunting places and arguing with very powerful people. The impact is ongoing, but from consultation it looks high likely they will get lights or another safety feature in Roundwood Park. The students continue to fight for a safer community in Harlesden. They show bravery, compassion and dedication to making their local community safer.





Schools of Sanctuary

A School of Sanctuary is a safe, welcoming place, especially for those seeking sanctuary. It is a school who welcomes asylum seeking and refugee families into their school community and fosters a culture of welcome and inclusion for all.

On June 11th, we passed our appraisal to become a 'School of Sanctuary' The feedback from Ben Margolis, South East, Eastern and Central Regional Coordinator of City of Sanctuary was "On behalf of the City of Sanctuary network I want to congratulate you on being recognised as a School of Sanctuary! I have read dozens of applications from schools applying to be Schools of Sanctuary, and visited many of them, and I have rarely if ever seen such an embedded commitment from a school to being a place of sanctuary that we saw at Newman Catholic College. The focus group with students in particular will stay with me - to hear children of any background at any school talking of feeling part of a family, and so welcomed and supported, is a joyful experience.

We are also grateful for the active role you are playing in Brent Borough of Sanctuary and your commitment to supporting other schools and places of worship working towards being recognised as places of sanctuary. We very much look forward to working with you on this and to building a culture of welcome across Brent...and elsewhere.


We were presented with our award at a special ceremony on June 20th to celebrate Refugee Week.

Summer 2019



Easter: Jesus is risen, Alleluia!!

Pesach:

Passover is one of the most important religious festivals in the Jewish calendar. Jews celebrate the Feast of Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) to commemorate the liberation of the children of Israel who were led out of Egypt by Moses. Pesach is God's intervention to save his people. The sacrificial lamb was offered according to the Law of Moses. Jesus is often referred to as the Lamb of God. The lamb that saves God's people. "Lamb of God you take away the sin of the world... grant us peace."



Lenten Collection:

The procession of Our Lady of Willesden:

May is traditionally called the Month of Mary, the Mother of our Lord. Families offer the rosary for the special intentions. The Blessed Virgin Mary has a special role in the church, the mother of all Christian. A group of Newman students gathered at Our Lady of Willesden RC church in Nicoll Rd. along with members of staff to take part in the Marian procession. Walking the streets of Harlesden, praying, singing and reminiscing about processions in their past. We paused in the grounds of the Convent (CJMLC). As we sat and listened to the sermons and prayers lead by Fr. Stephen, Fr. Andrew and guest speaker Fr. Martin Plunket. Afterwards the procession meandered its way back to the Shrine for benediction. It was great to see such a turn out, such a crowd.



Leavers Masses:

On the 24th May the school gathered to celebrate the successes of our Yr. 12 and 13s, while the Yr11 leavers Mass was on the 14th June. Both “Leavers Mass” were celebrated with Fr Albert.



The hymns were chosen by the staff and pupils as a Form. The readings, the altar servers, the procession of the gifts and the prayers of the faithful were all lead by the staff and students. The Year groups were facing their exams or at stages in the GCSE and A Level cycle, some had even come to the end of the exam season. It was a time to pray for various intentions: support in the future, strength in the exam period and thanksgiving for the experiences at Newman. The Mass was ready and the celebration began. The Bible readings focused on using what they have learnt to achieve a life of good

relationship with God and others. The 1st reading mentioned using their gifts of the Spirit, while the Gospel reminded them that they were the salt of the Earth. Fr Albert reminded them in his homily that they, like salt add flavour to the world around them, that they are needed and are valued. Psalm 139 “The Lord is always near me”, reminds us that as some leave Newman to move out into the wider world that the Lord is always near.

The Mass was ready and celebrations began. Psalm 139 was the psalm for the occasion “The Lord is always near me”, a proper time to remember that as some leave Newman to move out into the wider world that the Lord is always near. The offertory reflected their life and times at the college. A candle was presented the light of Christ, the way the truth and guides our lives and a globe to remind us of the presence of God no matter where we go. 
Pentecost:

The school celebrated mass for the feast of the coming of the Holy Spirit. -"Veni Sancte Spiritus" We pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit as the apostles did at the 1st Pentecost. Some pupils are in the process of preparing for confirmation – becoming adults in the faith of the Church. As they prepare, we remember them and pray for them. The chapel décor has changed to reflect the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit. We ask God to send his Spirit on the students as they sit their GCSE and A-levels.



Exam Period:


Adoremus Mass:

We worked with UCL on campaign and research exercises that looked at our identity and where belong in the UK, are student's becoming 'forgotten' due to the hostile environment policy.



Lighting in Roundwood Park.

On 14 May 2019 students from London Citizens visited the Brent Civic Centre to speak to Councillor Mohammed Butt and others about what action would be

taken on the lighting in Roundwood Park. This campaign started earlier this year as London Citizens, a foundation not funded by the government is trying to better London. Members found out that students did not feel safe while walking through the skate park at dark. They continued by asking local residents what their thoughts on this issue were, and were surprised to find that they felt the same.

When the students sat around the table there was a sense of hope in the room. We found out that the Councillors were onboard with lighting up the park but there were a few dilemmas.

- Firstly the disturbance of wildlife would pose a problem as lighting could affect animals such as bats.

- Secondly Councillors argued that the instalment of lights could intact cause a spike in crime around the area as it would attract criminals to the spot. However students argued that lights would in fact reduce the chance of thugs entering the park at night as they would be substantially easier to spot and would allow civilians to identify these people.

- Finally, and arguably the strongest problem with the lights was money. Councillors explained it would cost around £60,000 to install lights into the park and they did not have that sort of money lying around. Students countered this argument by saying that there was more than enough money in CIL funding, money received when new buildings are constructed within a certain area. However were then told that the CIL funding would not be able to be put towards the lights as it did not belong in that area of Brent.

Despite the students facing a few problems, they walked away feeling both elated and enlightened (no pun intended) and hopeful that they would get the lights within the near future. We are now working on ways to raise money for these lights as we would like to have them as early as the next academic year, hopefully before the winter months.



On Friday night June 21st, we had our annual homeless sleepover. There were 17 students and 4 staff who slept in the school hall to raise money for St Mungos a charity working to end homelessness and rebuild lives. The housing crisis means so many people are being forced out of London due to high rent costs and housing caps. This action enabled our students to try to walk in the shoes of many who are forced to sleep rough each night. Students raised £130 to give to St Mungos. One of London Citizens key campaigns is tackling the housing crisis in London.

Introducing...Cultural Capital

Year 9's Fantastic FriYAY with Into University at Credit Suisse

On Friday 21 year nine pupils visited the major financial district in London Canary Wharf to be a part of the Business in FOCUS programme run by Into University at Credit Suisse. At Credit Suisse pupils found out about the bank's CEO Tidjane Thiam, a French-Ivorian banker and philanthropist, as well as having the opportunity to meet with the CEO of Asset Management. Inside this 21 floor luxury building pupils were taken to a large conference room and split into two groups, this was the start of their opportunity to **become** young business men. Each pupil had a role that ranged from Finance Manager, Chief Executive to Sponsor Relations Manager or Artistic Director; pupils read their job description and delved straight into their jobs efficiently. Watching my Year nine students work as a team to pitch their vision and plans for the 'Global Games' was a pleasure. I was particularly impressed by the works of the debate managers (Thierry Halgand team Madrid and Melchezdek DeFour team Chicago) who had to pitch to the panel of credit Suisse employers why their given city was the best to host the next Global games; their statistics, arguments presented, questions for the opposition and rebuttals were fantastic, it was like watching an episode of question time with future politicians. The Into University Business in FOCUS workshop is aimed at developing business and life skills such as money management, team building, leadership skills, creativity, delegation, improved organisation and presentation skills. I saw a real boost in the pupils' confidence and they impressed the employees at Credit Suisse. In a few years they are likely to be the CEO's of the future.....

TYBURN CONVENT

Mr Hughes and Miss O'Connell brought 30 Year 8 students who either made progress or worked hard in Religious Education to Hyde Park and the Tyburn Convent near Marble Arch as a rewards trip.

Did you know the history of the area now known as Marble Arch?

Every year the students are shocked by the gruesome history of Marble Arch.

So you could be easily forgiven for missing this insignificant traffic island in the middle of a busy road junctions; surrounded by three saplings, you'll find this plaque embedded in the pavement 'THE SITE OF TYBURN TREE'. So what's the story?


TYBURN TREE

Marble Arch and the area around it was formerly known as Tyburn. Never an actual tree, Tyburn Tree was the site of public hangings for practicing Catholics, possibly established as early as 1108, the first recorded execution was in 1196. From 1571 a wooden scaffold was erected in a triangular shape, able to host three hangings simultaneously, perfect for a waiting crowd eager for some entertainment.

A short walk down Bayswater Road will take you to the Tyburn Convent. Founded in 1901 the convent was set up to pray for the souls of 105 Catholic martyrs who were executed between 1535 and 1681. Tyburn is a closed convent, meaning the nuns here (of which there are around 20) never leave this site and at all times there is at least one person praying for the souls of Catholic martyrs. It seems such a strange juxtaposition, to have a group of women who have intentionally shut themselves away from the world yards away from the busiest Shopping Street in Europe.

The students themselves found this when they were sitting in the downstairs chapel listening to a historical explanation by Sister Mary. They learned about the horrific execution process of being hung, drawn and quartered. They were able to examine relics of these Catholic martyrs and ask questions.

Over a cup of tea and a biscuit afterwards they were able to speak to Sister Marie about her vocation.

HISTORY

Year 10 Museum of Docklands

As part of their GCSE preparations, Year 10 will be visited the Museum of London, Docklands.

Here they deepened their knowledge of the impact of the London Blitz and why the London Docks were so important during the war.

Year 9 History Walk 17th July

Field trips

Year 10 is when Geography students at Newman graduate from classroom pupils to real life geographers. You can see it in their eyes and the actions of pupils as they climb into a river to take measurements and gather samples.

Fieldwork is a key component of the new GCSE geography curriculum. 2019's Year 10 field trips were to Epping Forest and Stratford.



At the Field Studies Council centre in Epping Forest the boys discovered geographical skills first hand measuring the quantities and qualities of Debden Brook. The pupils were testing out the Bradshaw Model which shows how a river's properties (size, velocity, sediment load) change as it travels downstream.

To see pupils such as Ryden and Shaquan enthusiastically clambering into the river with a tape measure and other instruments is to see students transformed and becoming real geographical investigators.

Just as impressive was the classwork carried out afterwards. The day after the field trip the boys used the information they had gathered to create their own graphic results. So keen were the pupils to test their own findings that many of the boys, including Caio and Simeon, voluntarily stayed late at school completing graphs. The experiences they gained should help them immensely in Paper Three of their Geography GCSE next summer.

Later in the summer term the class visited Stratford to examine first hand the results of one of the biggest urban regeneration schemes in Britain, built around the Olympic Park. This exercise had been designed by Mr Dunne in 2018 and revised by Ms Whitehouse for this year.

The Year 12 GCSE geography cohort will carry out their own fieldwork exercises in September.

Now it's time to move on to my first full teaching post I know that I am going to miss Newman. I am particularly going to miss 7 and 8 Francis, two classes I have taught throughout my training year. They are wildly mixed bunches, with the full range of abilities and characters, and present plenty of challenges. But there is some great learning and camaraderie, plenty of effort, and, in time, I hope there will be some great geographers.



Art trip to The British Museum.

On Tuesday 9th July the Year 9 and 10 GCSE Art groups had a most enjoyable visit to The British Museum to view the Edvard Munch 'Love and Angst' and the Manga Exhibitions.

During the morning the students immersed themselves into the fantastic printmaking created by Edvard Munch (notably known for his famous 'Scream' painting. This is the largest show of his prints in the UK for nearly 50 years.

In the afternoon they entered a graphic world where art and storytelling was stunningly presented in the largest exhibition of Manga ever to take place outside of Japan.

"Manga is a visual narrative form that has become a multimedia global phenomenon, telling stories with themes from gender to adventure, in real or imagined worlds. Immersive and playful, the exhibition explores manga's vast appeal and cultural crossover, showcasing original Japanese manga and its influence across the globe, from anime to 'cosplay' dressing up. This influential art form entertains, inspires and challenges – and is brought to life like never before in this ground –breaking exhibition".




THE BRITISH MUSEUM.

EXHIBITION



For his final A level creation, Thiago reflected on the serious aspect of Global Warming; he prepared extensively and his 15 hour timed exam consisted of two distinct triptych images. These are extracts of what he has written about his work.

“My two final images show me on a tree. On the first one with the green background entitled ‘Stanmore Marsh’ I am represented taking care of Nature and, in a state of peace and serenity, nearly becoming one with Nature. The colours on the main piece and within the panels, inspired by William Morris and Adriana Barra are harmonious and vibrant; my body language is relaxed, yet vigilant, protective and aware of the future.

In contrast with this, the second triptych entitled ‘Stanmore Marsh Forever?’ with its sombre red background depicts me stepping down onto the viewer in a more violent pose. Willow branches used as stencils on the main panel and as a textured collage material on the sides, symbolise chaos and disarray; poppy petals, preserved with a coat of acrylic spray paint symbolise death and the misuse of plastics.

Both paintings directly answer the exam theme of similarities and variation; with symbolise and meaningful narrative it shows the relationship between man and nature. Man can have a massive impact, good and bad; it’s left to us to choose what path to take. Global Warming is becoming a very dangerous and real issue to the future of Earth and I want to question the decisions we make and how they can affect nature.

With this visual narrative I have questioned how far we can go as a society before we completely destroy Nature. It is possibly a prediction of how the future could be if we do not do anything to change or take another path. Everything may look calm and peaceful now, but without change we could soon descend into chaos.

When preparing for these paintings I took lots of positive risks; however to improve myself as an artist I have to keep constantly pushing myself from outside of my comfort zone and from every mistake I made I became more confident with my abilities. Personally I see myself as someone who would always choose the easy path, or I would never want to push myself to try something new because the fear of failure would always take over me. However this exam allowed me to explore new things and I found myself continuously forging ahead even if things did not turn out exactly how I wanted them to.

The painting are emotive and atmospheric. They contrast against each other, demonstrating opposite emotions, reinforced by colour and different perspective points.

I was able to create an immersive narrative that takes the viewer into a journey that questions their present ideas and explores new ones. The focal point of these images is the relationship of man with Nature, artistically emphasised with fine detail, technique, colour, texture and foreshortening.

In all, 71 students completed a Level 2 qualification in Performing Arts, the largest cohort ever to have chosen this pathway. This required incredible commitment from staff and students alike. We continue to develop and grow, delivering high quality courses and providing opportunities to be involved with activities outside the classroom. Recruitment for our level 3 courses has doubled for September 2019.

In the new academic year, we move to encompass the four creative subject areas under the faculty of Creative Arts, working jointly on major projects and creating relevant and exciting cross curricular work. The departments are Art, D&T, Music and Performing Arts.

I will begin by writing about our most recent performance "Walk or Die". A true story of a young boy who walked 6000 miles from Afghanistan through six countries arriving here in the back of a lorry carrying toys for Christmas. It was a touching, beautiful play, performed by a group of Yr 11 students and the focus in the school and in Brent for Refugee week. It had added poignancy as our school has just achieved school of Sanctuary for Refugees, the first in London.

Workshops play a vital role in introducing students to industry professionals and also allowing them to gain in-depth knowledge of a specific area. 


Royal Institute Maths Masterclasses

Apply for free school meals

If you meet the criteria you can apply by:

- Asking your child's school for an application form which you can return to them or us
- Contacting Brent Customer Services Team on 0208 937 3110 for a paper copy of the application form which they will post to you.

The application form is only for a child or young person who attends a school or nursery in the London borough of Brent.

We will ask for proof of Child Benefit to be provided if this is your first application for free school meals. Eligibility for free school meals will not be backdated, so ensure you apply as soon as possible.

Please note that providing us with an email address or mobile number (or both) will help to ensure we can regularly inform and update you on the progress of your application.

Working Tax Credit exception

If you receive [Working Tax Credit](#) your children may be entitled to free school meals:

- for no longer than four weeks from the date you became unemployed (or reduced your working hours to less than 16 per week) and started receiving Working Tax Credit.

In this case you will need to provide evidence of your benefit. You need to make sure this information shows the date you became unemployed, or the date you reduced your hours, because free school meals are only available to parents on Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

If you have been unemployed and receiving Working Tax Credit for longer than four weeks, then your children are not entitled to free school meals.

If your Working Tax Credit stops and you begin receiving a different benefit that is one of the qualifying criteria listed above, you will continue to be eligible after the four-week period.

If you increase your hours or begin working and continue to receive Working Tax Credit your free school meal entitlement will stop.

Parents have the option of topping up Parent Pay online (there is a link at the top of the school website home page) or by going to a shop displaying the Parent Pay sign. All parents should have received a unique login (for the internet) and payment card (to be used in shops).
