Literacy is the way in which we read, write, speak and listen in a way that lets us communicate effectively and make sense of the world.


Here at Newman Catholic College we understand that supporting literacy in each subject helps students make progress across the curriculum.

LEXIA POWERUP

ACCELERATED READER

Accelerated Reader (AR) helps pupils make progress in reading.

Pupils in EAL College can access books online through Oxford Owl and then quiz them in Accelerated Reader. All pupils have been given user names and passwords.

Find AR on the NCC website. Pupils can quiz books at school and at home.

MATHS

It is important that students build good study habits from the very beginning. Students should try to revise Mathematics as often as possible, preferably every day.

Having a good knowledge of times tables up to x12 is necessary for all students to make progress. That is why if they need extra practice to gain confidence, they should practise times tables tests regularly using the websites listed below.

Spelling - To assist your child with spelling use the **look-say-cover-write-check** method. First you look at the shape of the word, then you say it. Next you cover it. Then you write it and then check that it is correct. You repeat this process if you have spelled it incorrectly. Writing in cursive or joined up letters can help some learners with spelling.

Also, encourage your child to keep a note-book of any new words they encounter.

ASDAN

ASDAN stands for Award Scheme Development and Accreditation Network. It is an education charity, which aims to help young people develop knowledge and skills for learning, work and life in general.

ASDAN offers a range of nationally approved qualifications based around the development of personal, social and employability skills.

There are no written exams, so students build up a portfolio of work over the duration of the course. This portfolio of evidence is submitted to ASDAN and then pupils will be awarded their certificates.

Employers are looking for the skills developed through these courses, therefore, the support of parents and carers is extremely important.

Parents and carers can help by encouraging pupils to read the newspapers, watch or listen to the news, take them to interesting places and give them practical tasks to do, for example writing the family's weekly shopping list.


The Big History Timeline Wall Book by Christopher Lloyd






When students are studying a historical text they should always remember that the skills they must have are:





WHY USE LEXIA?

There are two programmes in Lexia, Lexia Core 5 and Lexia PowerUp.

<u>Lexia PowerUp</u> is designed for more confident EAL learners. It initially assesses students' reading abilities and automatically places them at the appropriate level in 3 Study Strands:

Word study-targets gaps in basic reading skills and develops academic vocabulary.

Grammar- improves written composition and reading comprehension. **Comprehension**-teaches the skills required for higher order text analysis. Once placed, students work independently on each strand where they can monitor progress on their personal dashboard. To support independent learning and maximize time on the program, Lex-

<u>Lexia Core 5</u> is designed for beginner EAL learners. The program creates personalized learning paths for each student.

Phonological Awareness

Phonics-knowledge of letter sounds **Structural Analysis**-knowledge of words derived from Latin and Greek support vocabulary.

Automaticity/Fluency-sentence structure analysis and timed silent reading.

Vocabulary- learning new words.

Comprehension-students develop the ability to understand information.

RELIGION

How to help your child to improve literacy in Religion:

Check regularly with your child by asking 'what topics' they are learning. Your child should show you a RE journey map, which shows which module they are studying.

Ask them to highlight and verbally explain the key words linked to that topic learned in class.

Encourage your child to learn the spelling of these key words and their meanings.

Check with your child if they know about their termly Knowledge Organiser. Go through with them and ask them to explain it to you.

Proofread work tasks with your child to ensure that their work is clearly explained.

Ask them to read back their work/
homework to you for them to
practice good pronunciation of
English Language and to
strengthen what they have
learned in class.

Check your child's work. Even if you do not understand the content, you will be able to clearly see if your child has done their best and presented it neatly.

HOW TO USE THIS RESOURCE

- **1.** Ensure your son or daughter can spell these words. Look at spelling strategies at https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/quides/zq296fr/revision/1
- 2. Ask your son or daughter to explain what the words mean within the relevant context.
- **3.** Ask your son or daughter to check their work, have they used the correct spelling and used the word correctly in their books?
- **4.** Give your son or daughter spelling tests to check they can spell the words correctly.
- **5.** Ask your son or daughter to contact their teachers if they need any specific help.
- **6.** Print this resource and display it at home.
