Dear Parent/Carer,

Welcome to our Autumn Term edition of The Newman. I write to you as we come to the end of my first term as Head teacher at Newman Catholic College. In my thirteen years at the school thus far, I have seen the school grow, change, adapt and thrive. I am excited by the opportunities that lie ahead for our school community. I would like to make myself available to any parent who has any concerns or questions every week. Without appointment, I will be available each Tuesday from 3.30-4.15 if you would like to drop in, even if just for a conversation or support.

We have worked hard on reviewing our Teaching and Learning and Assessment procedures this year. This will mean you will see more consistency across how staff deliver learning, of their expectations, and for homework. We will also have a new reporting system in place for you, to make the reporting of student progress easier to access and interpret for parents.

We have two exciting developments taking place on the school site over the next year and beyond. We have additional provision for students with Special Educational Needs being built in a permanent building on site. This will offer over twenty new students specialist provision on a main school site. This should be finished in 2024. Furthermore, we have offered to temporarily host the Manor School's Key Stage 3 provision on our site temporarily, whilst they are having their permanent building in Wembley developed. This is an opportunity for our community yet again to show that we care for and support our local schools, and we will learn so much from this link.

We would like to wish Ms Donne good luck who is leaving us after 18 years of dedication and service. She leaves us for a promotion to a Deputy Headship, and we thank her for her years of service to the Languages Department and to the Senior Leadership Team (SLT). I am pleased to say that Ms Vitamore will be joining the SLT as associate Assistant Head teacher and Ms Palmer will be interim Curriculum Leader for Mathematics. Finally, I would like to draw your attention to an article released by the Daily Mail entitled ["800,000 pupils from poor families are being denied free school meals"](#) - this was published last week, and highlights both the challenges many parents face in our community, and how it impacts on our young learners.

Our school has a rich history of community and charitable work, which is reflected not just in this article, but also the NCC Foodbank run by Mr Roche, Ms Kiernan and Ms Grace and students. I'd like to thank them for all of the hard work they put into this every week. We have also raised £900 for Breast Cancer research and awareness this term, so thank you to Pili Regueira for her leadership on the annual 'Pink' day.

We look forward to welcoming students back on Wednesday 4th January (red week) for an 8.40 start. On behalf of the whole school community, we would like to wish our families a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

He organised our Anti Bullying week awareness and produced a PowerPoint presentation about bullying for teachers to use in class. Antonio did the Anti Bullying presentations to his peers. He also organised Odd Socks day and a video to raise awareness that it is okay to be different and unique. Antonio also initiated a 'Stop Bullying' button on our school desktop page, which students can click to link for Anti Bullying support and resources. Antonio completed Anti Bullying Ambassador training with the Diana Award. Antonio's efforts show that if we work together as a school, we can reduce bullying together.

Antonio is a qualified St John's Ambulance First Aider. He has supported Mr Finnie, our Curriculum Leader of Physical Education and Mr Jeeves to deliver basic First Aid training to all Year groups as part of our PSHE Health and Well Being Drop Down Days during 2019-2022.

Since March 2020, Newman Catholic College have been running a Foodbank a response to support 50 vulnerable families who have struggled with Food Poverty due to being furloughed, made redundant, no recourse to public funds, universal credit etc. Antonio is one of the students who volunteer and he helps the staff who also volunteer to run this every Friday afternoon. His friendly demeanour and smile make people feel welcome. He always goes the extra mile in helping us set up and pack away. His commitment is outstanding.

Antonio was also a member of our Youth Travel Ambassador Group (YTA). As part of YTA, Antonio was involved in researching and developing road safety campaigns with other students. This has focused on how students travel to school whether it be walking and cycling, road safety or improving the bus experience. Antonio also worked with other YTA students to deliver assemblies to all year groups on Road Safety awareness. Antonio supported the YTA staff to deliver Road Safety Awareness to Year 7 students as part of our Health and Well Being Drop Down Days.

Antonio has also been an active member of our Student Council for the past five years. This year he was elected as the Student Council chairperson. Antonio has shown that he is highly committed to everything he undertakes. He is deserving of this award as he is an inspiration to his peers, staff and those who meet him. He is a true student leader who wants to make a difference and create a better, more just society in this challenging world.

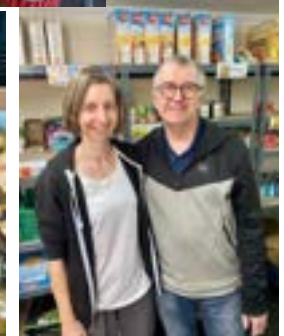

Careers News KS4 Medical Science Project

Congratulations to the Year 11 students who took part in the Medical Science Project, the initiative of a past pupil of the school, **Dr Rossby Awadzi BSc, MSc, MBchB and Get medical CEO**.

The students (pictured below) gave their time after school on Thursdays during the summer term of Year 10. This proved to be a fantastic opportunity for them to learn from a team of experienced doctors. During the project, the pupils were encouraged to discuss various clinical cases of disease and then created resources and videos to help teach and inform other students and health care workers across the Boroughs of Brent, Ealing and Harrow. This involved students using their learning to participate in recorded interviews with senior health care professionals.

The highlight of the project was the **GetMedical Surgical Skills Workshop** where a team of doctors ran a session on site as an introduction to the world of surgery. Students were taught anatomy and physiology in relation to surgical skills. The experience gave them a greater understanding of basic biology through the recreation of a realistic surgical environment in the science laboratory.

We owe an enormous thanks to Dr Rossby and his team for providing such a wonderful experience.

Careers News KS4 Medical Science Project



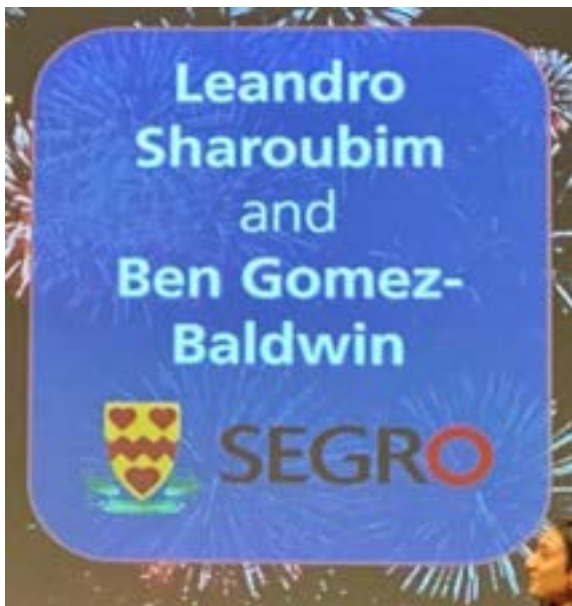

Drop Down Days

With students facing pressures both within and outside of school, PSHE is a subject dedicated to providing a safe space in which students are encouraged to openly explore issues relevant to their lives, such as mental health and relationships. Drop Down Days' strengthen their PSHE curriculum and make student learning more effective and relevant. Drop Down Days', are off-timetable' days, with activities used to strengthen students' practical application of skills and provide a deeper learning experience. At NCC Drop Down Days focus on specialist workshops. Our PSHE curriculum, aims to give our students the skills and knowledge to become independent, confident, healthy and responsible members of society. PSHE education covers mental health and wellbeing; physical health (including healthy lifestyles and first aid); learning about safe, healthy relationships and sex (including understanding consent, negotiating life online, intimate relationships).

We had Drop Down Days for Year 7,9 and 10. The Year 8 one has to be rescheduled due to the snow. Workshops focused on Mental Health and Music, Knowing Yourself, Leadership, Self Defence, First Aid, Gambling Addiction, Personal Safety. Maths Department News

Sparx and Hegartymaths

This year the Maths department are fortunate to continue working closely with Sparx and Hegartymaths to improve upon their already excellent online provision.

All students have individual log ins (year 7 and 8 sparxmaths, year 9, 10, 11 hegartymaths) and can use these accounts to access high quality videos and questions that give immediate feedback for their own independent study.



Financial Maths:

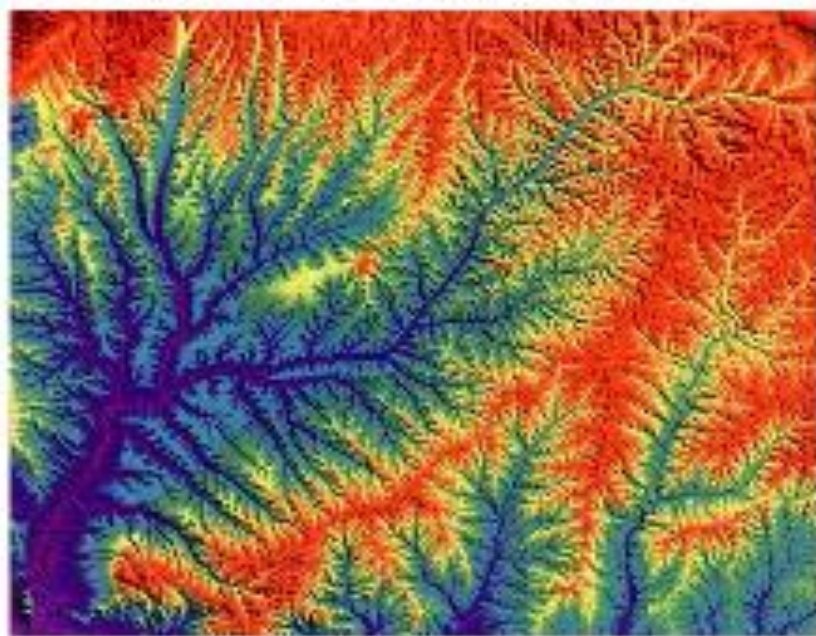
This year we are continuing our commitment to support the development of students' financial literacy using the 'Your Money Matters' programme, endorsed by Martin Lewis of Money Saving Expert. This term year 8 explored value for money and discussed how to use comparison websites and how to shop around to get the best deals. Upcoming topics for other year groups will include budgeting, interest, savings, understanding payslips and tax.

History of Maths:

Students continue to explore the history of maths. This term we have looked at origins of number systems, history of algebra, Emmy Noether and the history of pi. The oldest known reference to pi is on the Rhind Papyrus, an Egyptian artefact from circa 1650 BC. A Swiss mathematician, Leonard Euler, formalised the use of π as notation for this value in the 1700s.

Fractals

A fractal is a never ending pattern that repeats itself at different scales. This property is called 'self similarity'. Fractals appear in nature.

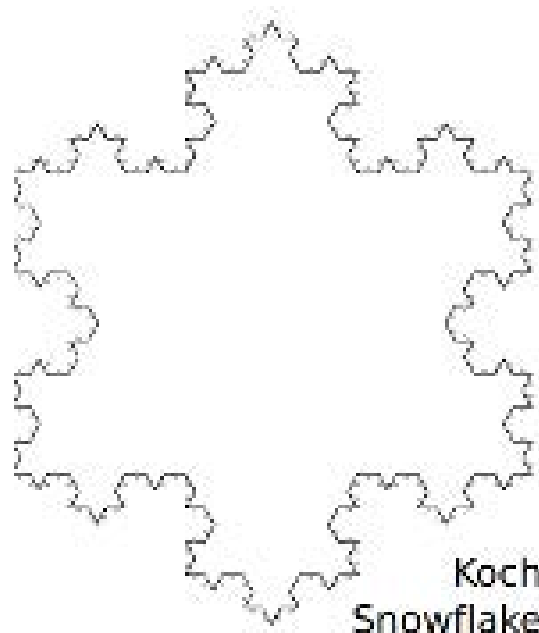


River network from the Shaanxi province in China. Colors represent elevation. Image: Bruce D. Malamud, Kings College London.

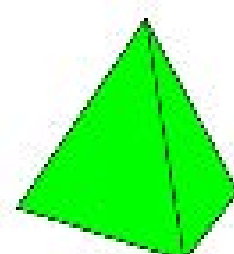
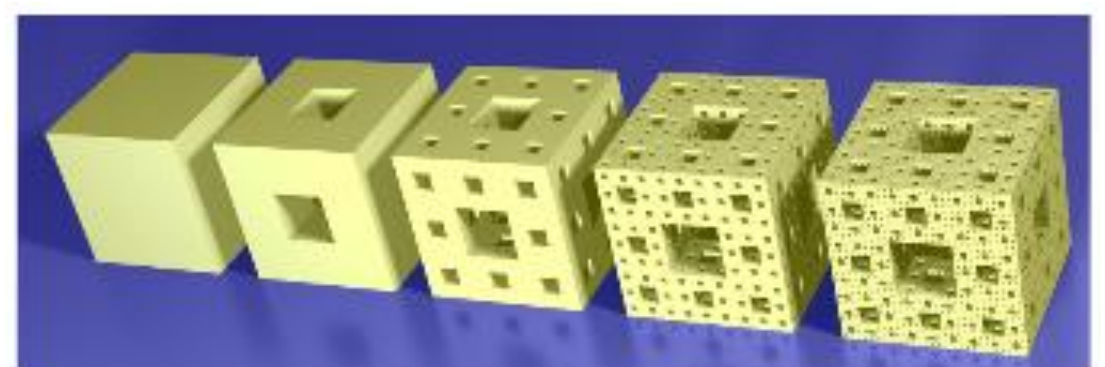


M51 the "Whirlpool Galaxy". Image: Nasa.

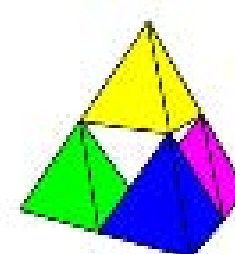

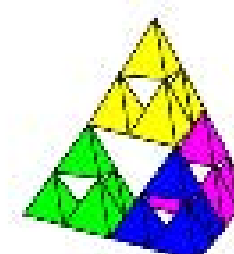
Koch Snowflake



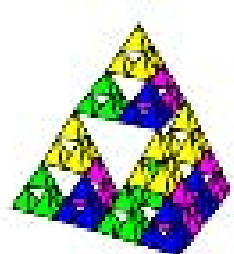
Stage 1 (tetrahedron)

Further Mathematics GCSE

The Maths department are excited to be able to offer Further Mathematics GCSE for invited students in year 10 this year. This course offers an excellent opportunity to consolidate more challenging topics from GCSE maths and introduce new concepts that students will need for A Level maths including the Factor Theorem, matrices and calculus.

Homework Club

From next term maths homework club will run Thursday lunchtimes in M47. Students will be able to access chromebooks and receive assistance with their homework tasks. Please encourage your child to take advantage of this support.

Equipment:

All students are required to have their full equipment, including a Maths set and a scientific calculator. These are available to buy through parent pay at a subsidised cost: £1 for a Helix Maths set, and £10 for a Casio fx-85GTX scientific calculator.

Using ‘Why Mummy’ Jargon to Understand Mathematics By Benjamin Anarfi-De-Khems

Understanding mathematics is a big concern for the government and mathematics educators. No wonder the government keeps on changing mathematics curriculums.

Sometimes mum or dad will say sorry son/daughter ‘I did not understand maths at school’ when you really need her/his help to understand a mathematical concept. But the questions are; “What is understanding mathematics?” and “How best can you as a student change your perception of mathematics and try your best to understand it?” Do you know why we add the powers of indices when multiplying indices with the same base? If you do, then you do understand a little bit of indices concept. Again, have you wondered why you have to divide by two when finding the area of a triangle? If you do, then you understand finding the area of a triangle. The reasons behind what we do in maths is the understanding of mathematics. This is what mathematics educators call conceptual understanding. Conceptual understanding measures the 'why' behind every concept in mathematics. The question then becomes - “How can I know the 'whys' behind every mathematics concept?”

Well this is very simple my friends. Do you remember when you were a three-year-old and used to question your mummy every time she asked you to do something? If you do not remember, then ask your mummy she will remind you. You were very annoying. This is how annoying Kofi was with his mum. Listen to the following conversation between Kofi and his mummy when he was a three-year-old:

Mummy: Kofi, come and put on your jacket.

Kofi: why mummy?

Mummy: because we are going to do some shopping.

Kofi: why mummy?

Mummy: because we need to buy some food stuffs?

Kofi: why mummy?

Mummy: so that you can get food to eat.

Kofi: why mummy?

Mummy: so that you can grow big and strong.

Kofi: why mummy?

Mummy: Kofi, can you please stop being annoying?

Kofi: why mummy?

Do you think Kofi was being annoying? I really don't think so. Kofi was trying to explore, be inquisitive and understand the world around him. As a student you are responsible for your actions and your learning. So why don't you be like Kofi and be an annoying student and keep asking why Sir or why Miss so that you can be inquisitive, explore and above all understand mathematical concepts? The 'Why' will help you to understand the mathematics. How many times have you asked your teacher why Sir or why Miss about the topic?

The 'why' which is the reasons behind the concepts will help you to understand mathematics. If you don't regularly use the 'why' to probe understanding then you are entering into the 'How' zone which is just the procedures, the step by step rules of solving a problem. This is what mathematics educators call procedural knowledge. The problem with this method of learning is that you cannot keep up with all the procedures in mathematics and definitely you are going to forget some of them if not all of them. This is the main reason why we do get stuck when solving a question. This is because you have forgotten about a particular formula you used to know. However, if you did go for the 'why' method of learning, since you already understand the concept, you will be able to deduce the procedures or the formula from scratch.

So you see the importance of being an annoying three-year-old? ‘Why Mummy’ jargon is Conceptual understanding, it helps you to explore, be inquisitive, and understand the mathematical concepts you don't like. You don't understand mathematics because you have stopped being the annoying three-year-old you used to be. So if you really want to understand mathematics yourself and stop hustling your mum and dad, then you need to act as the annoying three old again and keep asking the “whys” (the reasons behind the concepts) and stop receiving the “hows” (the procedures, the step by step rules or the formulas) from the teachers and I bet your understanding of mathematics will never be the same.

Performing Arts Christmas 2022

“Little Amal embodies a dimension of our human family that is travelling lost, at risk and in danger.” (Cardinal Vincent Nichols’ Christmas Message 2022)

The Performing Arts Department of Newman Catholic College is honoured to have supported Little Amal at the earliest stages of her development, in our Drama Studio, in 2019

(From the *Brent and Kilburn Times* 15th, December 2021 by Juliette Fevre)

“The Willesden students who inspired a 3.5puppet's 8,000km walk from Syria”

‘Good Chance theatre company created Little Amal having been involved with Newman Catholic School and hearing from pupils who also had memories of growing up in Syria.

As Little Amal’s 8,000km journey came to an end a month ago, Newman School recalled its collaboration with Good Chance, which started in 2018.

At the time, Dina Mousawi, creative producer at Good Chance Theatre and two artistic directors, Joe Robertson and Joe Murphy, set up a workshop to involve students in the creation of the puppet.

Among the students were Syrian-born Ghufra Al Taisnah and Nour Al Wadi, who would later be interns at Good Chance Theatre.

Behind the creation of the character of Little Amal, a story had to be made up involving a past, hobbies, and a personality.

Dina said: “Nour and Ghufra were vital in that because they lived in Syria and they know what it looks like to be an eight-year-old in Syria.”

Building a life from scratch starts with the smallest things, with details. What game does Little Amal love? What are her fears, dreams, hopes? Nour and Ghufra started to recall their childhoods in Syria.

When both girls were younger, families would go to large parks, or to the Citadel in Aleppo, to have picnics or barbecues until the early hours of the morning. This was a favourite thing to do for many children. And, naturally, for Little Amal as well.

Damas’ streets were filled with jasmine trees, it’s a smell that Little Amal loves. In summer, the character was written to enjoy sleeping on rooftops and watching the stars.

One day, the girls showed the crew how with a tissue, they made dolls, twisting the corners and ends to make the head, the waist, and arms. Time passed by, and Little Amal’s personality was drawn.

Ghufra and Nour namely witnessed Little Amal’s very first steps in a lavender field in Kent.

Shortly after Little Amal arrived in England, a group of Syrian students led by Mrs Beirne-Francis and Mrs Tetley, went to Lewisham to meet the now internationally known puppet.

It was an opportunity for them to listen to their parents’ experiences: “It shows us what journey our families had to go through to bring us here,” said one of them.

For instance, Yasmin and Yoni’s father had been lost in the mountains for 11 days with a group of people, with no water, while following smugglers.

Students’ stories all roughly follow the same narrative: fleeing the war, the dad was the one who went ahead. In England, he would obtain visas for his children and their mums. Most of them arrived in England when they were 10.

Mahmud’s story differs nevertheless, he had to do his very own walk with his mum and brother. He left Syria in 2014 to stay a few months in Lebanon and Turkey. They travelled for nine days on a boat to Italy where they stayed a few weeks before finally arriving in England. He was 11 at the time.

Little Amal had not been welcomed everywhere. In Greece and France, she faced hostility.

Students also recall being picked on a lot by other children when they arrived in England.

Language being the major issue: “Because you don’t speak English, you can’t defend yourself.”

Nour Al Wadi remembers how hard it was, to go to school, smile, laugh and do her homework like a normal child when every other day she was told that a new person she knew died in Syria. Mohammed added: “Here we have to act as we fit.”

Nour was surprised to see how people engage with Little Amal, but she’s doubtful: ‘Would you treat a real child like this? Would a real child be treated like this soulless puppet? Would they be equal?’

For Yasmin, the puppet is empowering: ‘It shows Syrians they can do it, that they can come to Europe.’

The name Amal means ‘hope’ in Arabic. Dina from Good Chance Theatre said: “I hope that we could live in a tolerant society where everybody has hope and understanding and empathy of the people in different situations to themselves.”

Mohammed, from Newman School, has hope for a “better life” for foreigners coming here.

To that extent, telling and listening to asylum-seekers stories seem vital.”

COLOMBIA:

Students in KS3, but also in KS4, learn about different traditions from a wide range of Spanish speaking countries, including Spain. One of those countries is Colombia. In year 9, the cultural capital input is focussed on Colombia and since it is Christmas time, I took the opportunity to introduce some of the typical and more important traditions in Christmas in Colombia. I hope you enjoy and learn something that you did not know.

Christmas in Colombia is not just a day, it's a season, but then when does the Christmas season start?

Well, officially the Christmas season starts on the 7th December with "El día de las velitas" (Little Candles Day).

Houses and streets are decorated with candles, lanterns and lots of lights. Some people design and hang their own cardboard lanterns, especially in smaller towns. There are also big firework displays, music and foods. But, arguably, we can say that the Christmas season starts a bit before, around the end of November but no specific date. How is that?

Colombian families gather together to set up their "arbolito de navidad" (Christmas tree, they use diminutives in Colombian (Spanish) and other decorations at home. Apart from the "arbolito de navidad", the second most important decoration is "El pesebre" (the nativity scene). For Colombians, it's important to set up the whole nativity scene -including the landscape- next to the Christmas tree.



From the 16th December until the 24th December, they do something in Colombia called "La novena de aguinaldos" (Christmas advent prayer). They normally just say "La novena", which literally means "ninth".

For the nine nights leading up to Christmas, people gather in each other's homes, traditionally to recite an old Christmas prayer. "Novenas" also take place at people's offices, malls, and public spaces. During a novena, be prepared to eat traditional Colombian Christmas foods and to sing traditional Christmas music, known as "villancicos" (carols).



If you think Christmas in Colombia starts by stumbling down the stairs in your pyjamas, sitting next to the freshly cut tree and opening presents, you are wrong.

While in many Northern European and North American countries Christmas is celebrated on December 25th (Christmas Day), in Colombia and many Latin American countries Christmas is celebrated on December 24th evening - to be more specific, at midnight.

On Christmas night, known as "nochebuena" families pray the last "novena", share a special dinner, and -at midnight- everyone starts opening the presents that Baby Jesus brought.

If you thought the fun ended on December 24, then you haven't celebrated Christmas in Colombia! Of course, there is another festivity in between Christmas and New Years'.

On the 28th of December, we celebrate something called "El Día de los Inocentes". It is kind of the Colombian version of April fools, where creating humour at your expense is the name of the game.

On this day people play tricks on each other, and even TV channels adapt their programs to this day by showing a lot of blooper shows.

Aguinaldos are those fun little games played by children and adults during the Christmas season.

One of the most popular and commonly played is known as Tres Pies: players try to slip one foot in between the feet of their opponents without them noticing.

Another popular one is Si o No - basically, you can't say one of those words.

People play those games for a few days any time during the Christmas season. They normally agree on certain points and the winner gets a small present.



Christmas traditions in French speaking countries



France

On the 24th of December, French families traditionally sit around the table for a long, often luxurious meal called a Réveillon. This often goes on until midnight and beyond and comprises of such delicacies as turkey served with chestnuts, you may also find lobster, snails, and oysters on the table, and for dessert, a Bûche de Noël, which is a chocolate yule log.

Canada

Whilst many Canadian Christmas traditions are similar to what we celebrate in the UK, many French Canadians may also choose to acknowledge Réveillon as well as midnight mass, a special ceremony in which the nativity scene is displayed below a Christmas tree, followed by a large banquet that carries on over the night. Gifts are usually exchanged on new years day.



Switzerland

On Christmas eve, Swiss families will typically celebrate with a festive meal followed by the revealing of the Christmas tree. The story of the nativity is then retold followed by the favorite alpine Christmas carol, "Stille Nacht," which originated in neighboring Austria. Children will then begin hunting for Christmas presents followed by an attendance of midnight mass.

Belgium

Just as in the UK, Christmas begins with a special meal usually consisting of turkey or game. Christmas markets are very popular in Belgium and one can often be found in most major cities and in some rural spots. Advent runs for four weeks and is symbolized in homes and churches with the display of advent wreaths and the lighting of candles.



Haiti

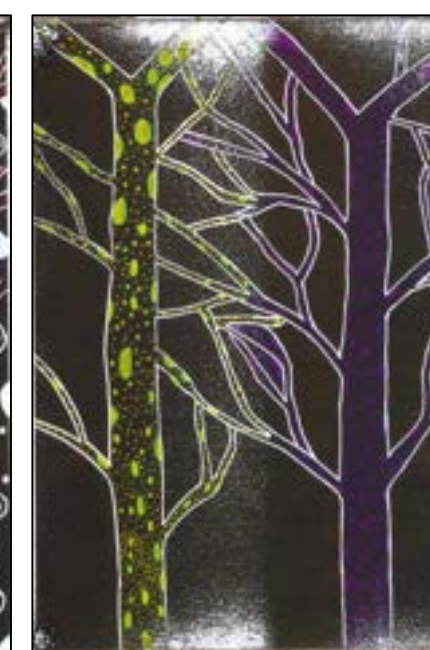
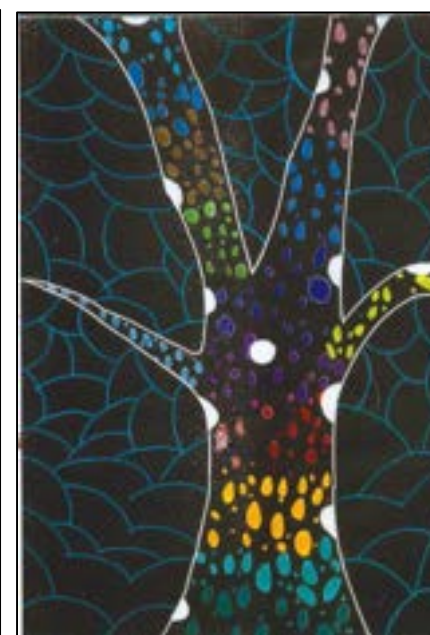
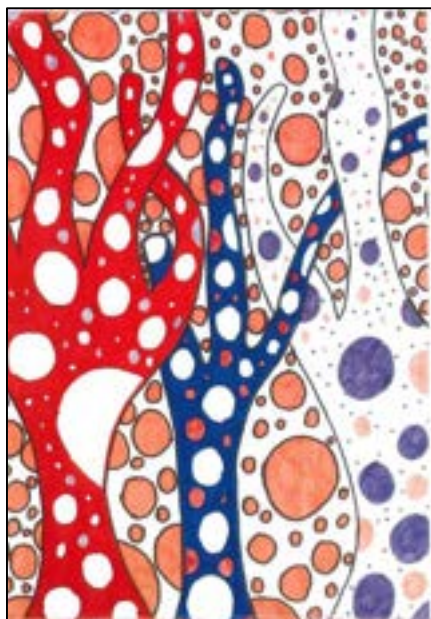
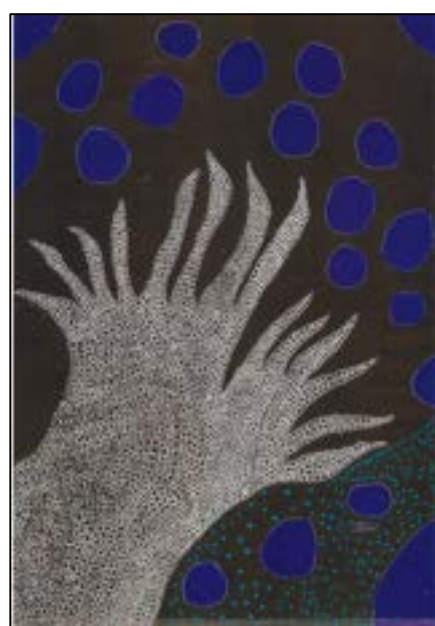
Christmas is usually celebrated on Christmas Eve in Haiti with many Haitians going to midnight mass. At midnight the traditional song "Minuit Chrétien" is sung by everyone in the assembly. The festivities traditionally continue until New Year's Eve which is celebrated with fireworks music and eating Pumpkin soup, a symbol of Haitian independence.

Refugee Project Interventions

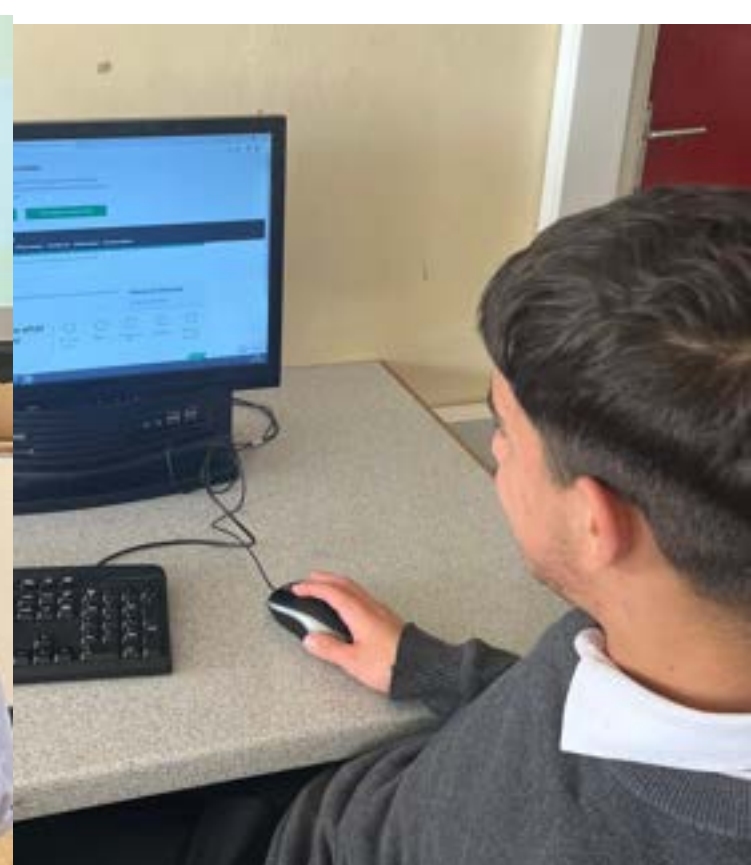
We currently have around 105 refugee and asylum seeking students in our school coming from Afghanistan, Albania, El Salvador, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Iraq, Iran, Kurdistan, Kuwait, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Ukraine, and Yemen. Of these we have 16 Looked after Children here without any family. These students are spread out through the different years and have differing abilities.

In order to help them to adjust, integrate and reduce isolation we offer a number of different interventions in the year for the students and families.

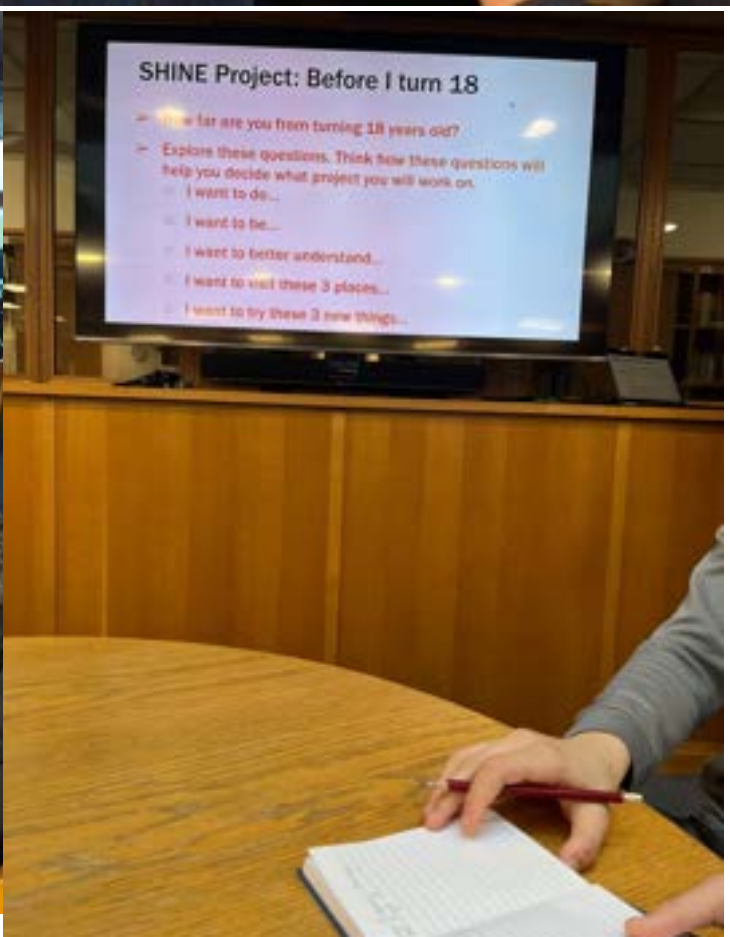




PLIAS- Careers advice with an organisation that aim to reduce the risk of exclusion. They provide support looking into future education, jobs and CV writing. PLIAS also ran a girls assembly for our students on identifying grooming and abuse in relationships, focusing on consent and empowerment.

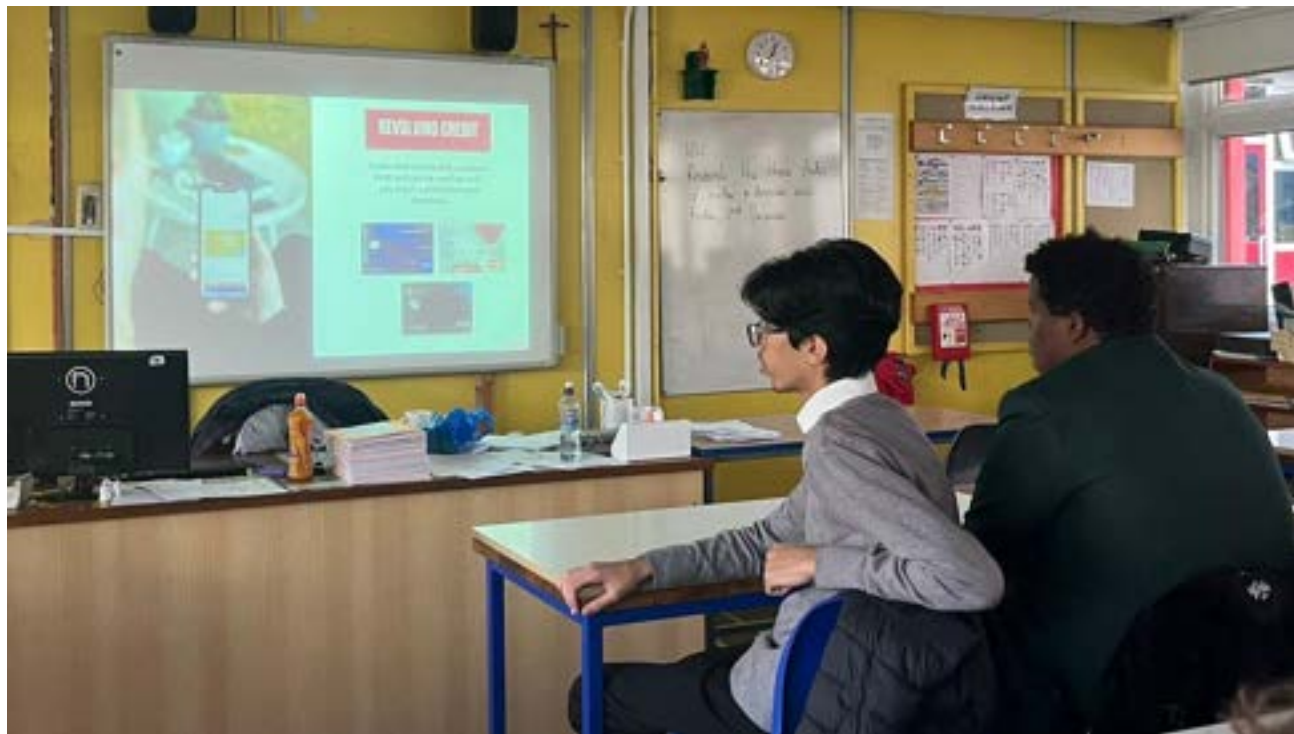


SHINE — a Saturday morning workshop at the American School London. These weekly workshops provide our students with opportunities they would not normally have, from meeting authors to robotics to textiles and much more! This years theme is *'Before I am 18...'*



Bang Edutainment – Bang run two workshops for us at the moment on Vital Skills (Digital Literacy) and Stacks (Financial Literacy). They are learning key information to improve their financial management, protect their future, use computers and social media to their advantage.

BANG



Pet Therapy/ Read2Dogs- A literacy and therapy intervention that allows students to share in a safe space. It is proven that reading to dogs helps build confidence in literacy skills and many students feel safer in the presence of an animal leading them to be more likely to share.

Forest and Friends — A group of 10 EAL, Refugee and Asylum Seeking and SEN students attend a weekly forestry school in Roundwood park. They focus on self leading, healthy boundaries, imagination and learning in nature.



Paiwand Boys Group — Paiwand Afghan Association run a weekly youth group for our students and newly arrived children. It's a safe space for them to socialise, practice English and learn. This is on Thursdays after school.



Kew Lights- As part of their Community Access Scheme, Kew Gardens gave us free tickets to visit their Christmas Kew Lights. We took 18 students to experience something new and explore their new city!



Winter Wonderland – Our annual parents trip to Winter Wonderland is a wonderful opportunity for parents to meet each other and explore London without their children so that they feel more comfortable. It gives them a chance to become more engaged with our school.





Do the Mic Thing – We had a taster workshop with Steve to introduce music as a way of sharing past trauma. We hope to raise enough funds to start 1:1 workshops next year!

EAL students enjoyed a day with BANG, an organisation that supports young people to be healthy, thriving and contributing positively to their communities.

“The lessons helped me in many different ways,” explained Osamah. “First of all they helped me to think about the job I want in the future and what I have to do to be able to get this job. The second thing I learned about was my classmates, what they are good at and what they need to develop. It made me understand them much better than before. Lastly, I learned about a Curriculum Vitae (CV) and how to make my own CV.” Mansour agreed that the lessons were helpful. “The teacher was so friendly and he taught us different kinds of lessons. I discovered different websites like Monster, Linked In etc. He discussed my goals, interests, hobbies and many more things about myself. I also learned how to create and design a CV and how to apply for different jobs. I enjoyed learning about the interests, hobbies and goals of my friends too.”

“The skills we learned were vital,” said Abdi. “Before this I didn’t really have any idea about how to search for a job. I also learned about the skills I need and how to apply for jobs.” Adilson said that he learned about computer skills. “The computer skills I learned were how to search for jobs, about CVs and how to create one. A CV tells someone about you and you need to include lots of information on it, then when you apply for a job you give them your CV.”

“It was very interesting to learn about soft skills and hard skills. I learned about which jobs need soft skills and which jobs need hard skills and then I searched online about jobs in the Police. Finally, I created my CV on the computer,” explained Jainik. “I found it useful learning about careers and the type of jobs I can do,” added Willyan. “I learned about what I’m good at and which skills I need to improve.”

“I was happy and proud because I stood in solidarity with people who are suffering from cancer. I hope they recover and that they will be well.”

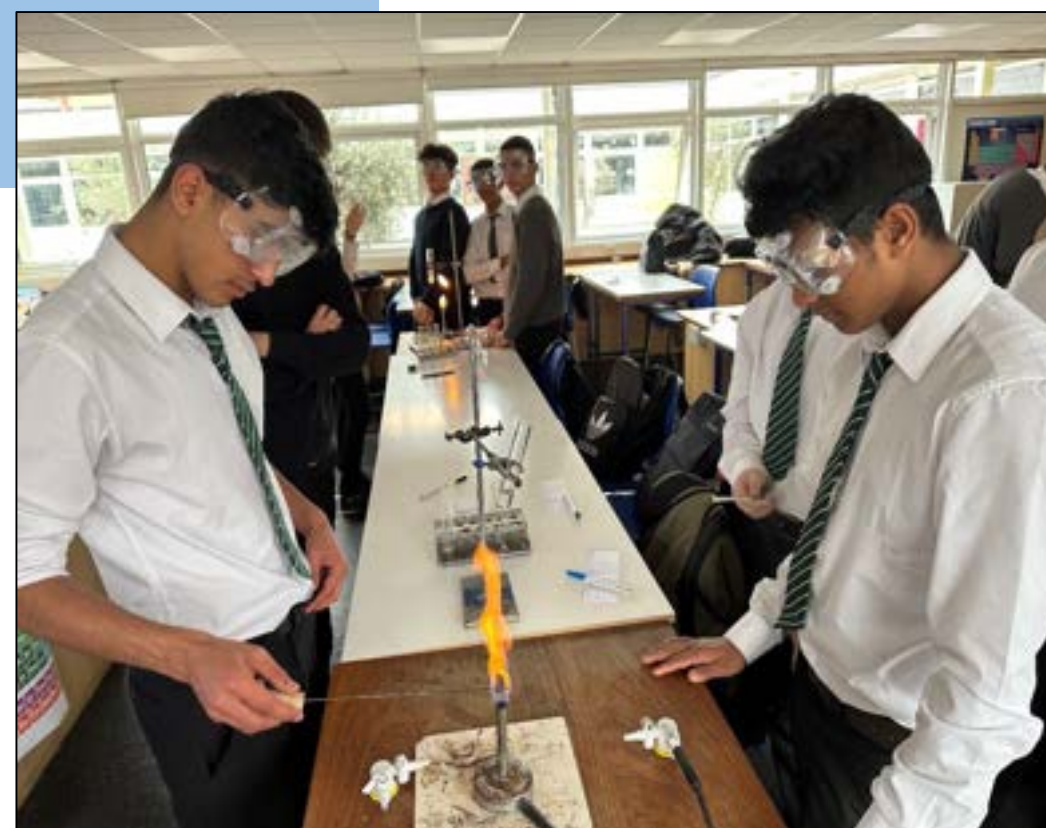

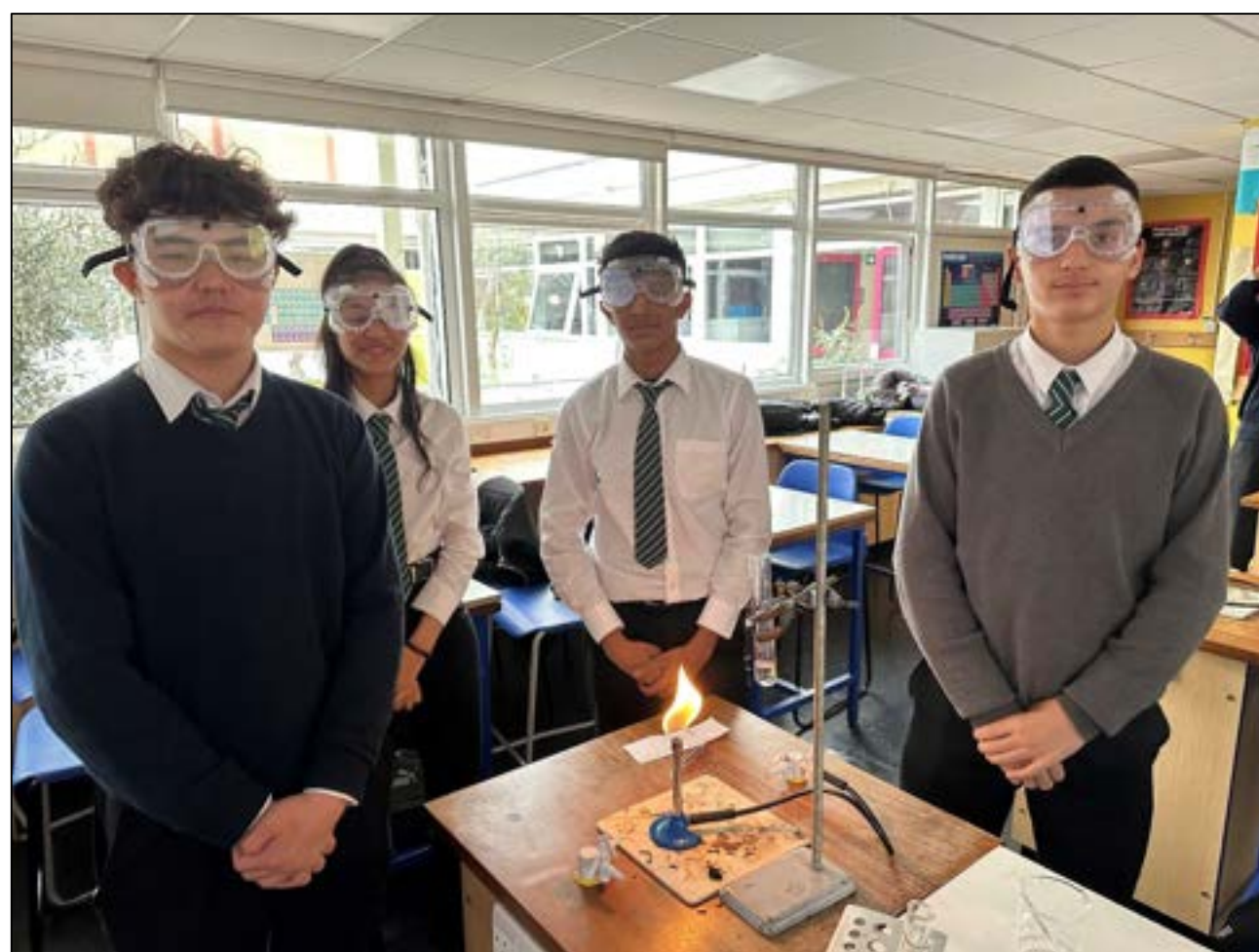

7 Joseph Skeletons lesson

- Year 7 students have been settling very well in the science department. They have been learning to investigate and analyse scientific questions, and they have been introduced to some physics, biology and chemistry topics.
- On the picture we see some students from 7Joseph after an exciting lesson about our bones taught by Mr. Skeleton! The students were introduced to the vocabulary and definitions of the topic. They then learned about the bone composition and labelled some bones. They finally used the model to look closely at the anatomy of the human skeleton.

Science Club

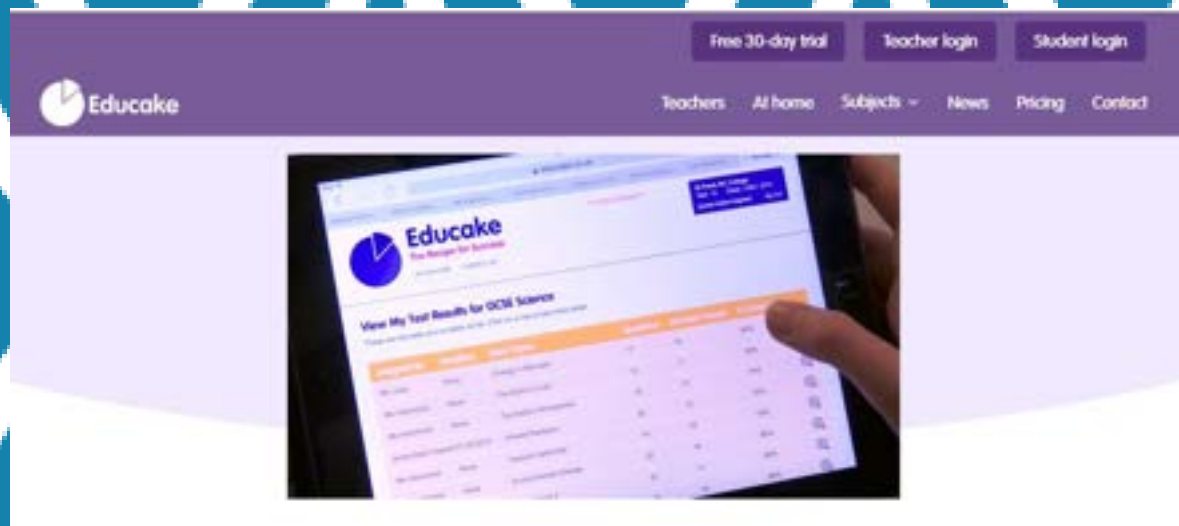
- Science club was restarted shortly after half-term. There has been a strong uptake by Y7 students. We hope to see this growth rate in participation continue in the near future. Science club runs weekly **(every Wednesday from 3.10 to 3.45pm)**.
- Initial activities involved pupils utilizing circuit boards to build their own circuits involving light bulb, motor and sirens. At present pupils are attempting an elephant toothpaste experiment to demonstrate a volcano setting involving the use of malt vinegar, baking soda, and washing-up liquid. We had a wonderful participation from Steven Murphy in Year 7 who demonstrated the reaction of baking soda and vinegar to release CO₂ gas that would be trapped by washing-up liquid in the form of foam.
- Next stages would involve participants to build a paper Mache volcano from scratch with cardboard, PVA glue, and newspapers to then model volcanic eruption utilizing the new found skills in elephant toothpaste experiment.

Food Burning Practical Year 9W science class

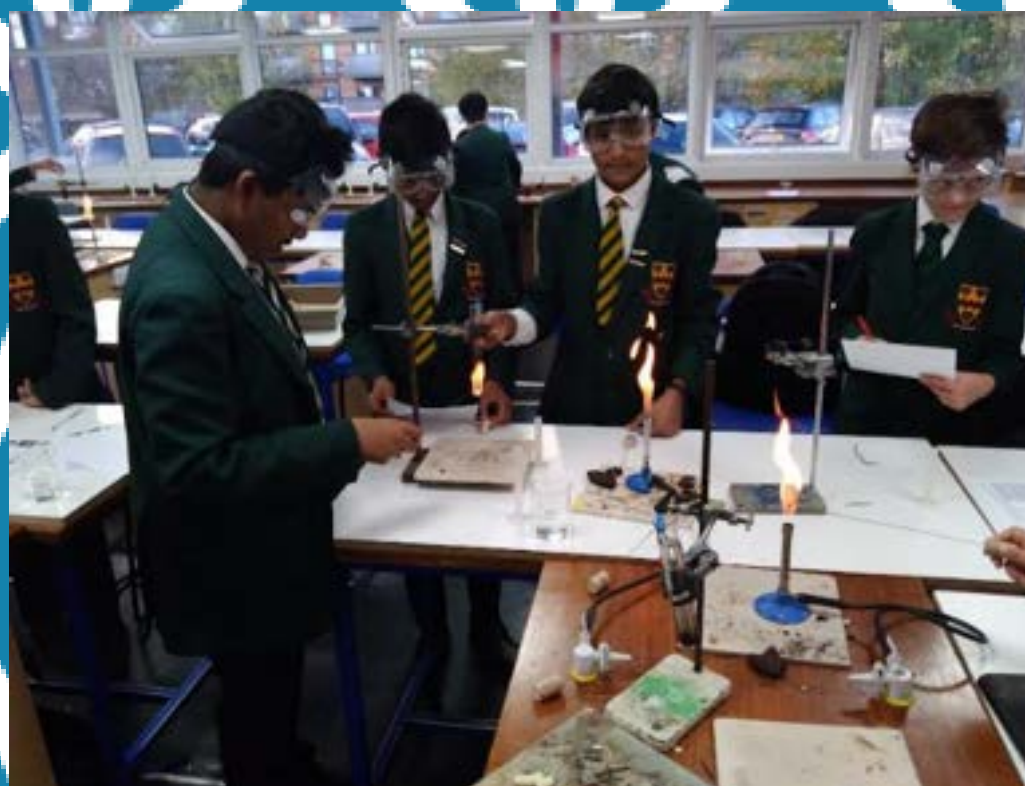
Our lovely 9W class was involved in doing the food burning practical.

In this practical, students burn a sample of a foodstuff of known mass, heating a known volume of water. From the measured temperature change, students calculate the energy transferred to the water, and hence estimate the energy present per unit mass of food.

This experiment can be used to compare the energy values quoted on food packaging with the data obtained from the experiment. Students can repeat results to determine repeatability and share results between pupil groups to determine reproducibility of data. This experiment is effective at evaluating the effectiveness of a method. All the students were able to explain why the data obtained from the experiment is significantly different to the energy values quoted on food packaging.

We also explored the idea of random and systematic errors.

- The Science department is using an online platform called Educake. With Educake teachers can assign homework and track students' progress using online formative assessment. Students can access Educake from their laptops, tablets or phones very easily. They can use this tool not only to complete homework but also to revise. They can track their progress as well as find their weak and strong points in the curriculum.
- Students seem to enjoy working on Educake.
- Andrei in Y8 finds it very useful to check his knowledge at the end of each topic. He also asks his teacher for clarification on areas he needs help with.
- Dawson Y9 says: 'I find Educake very easy to use, it allows me to check my knowledge on what I have learned'
- Ron Y9 says: 'I can use it on my way home or to school, all I need is an internet connection'

- Commissioned mosques to be built in the cities of Gao and Timbuktu (on the return trip)

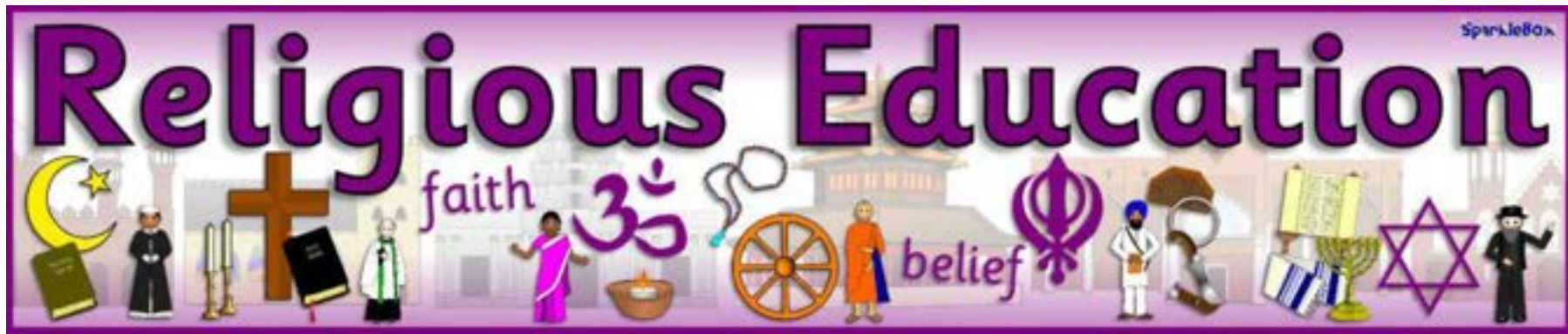

FIRM FOUNDATIONS: The school chaplain has joined up with Firm Foundations and advice to renters team so as to help those struggling with the Financial Crisis, the rising cost of living, the fuel and food costs and those who are renting privately or living in accommodation that is unfit etc. Pat Fernandes (Advice for Renters) and Sr Silvana (Caritas) are working alongside us and other schools, parishes, and groups to offer free advice. The school aims to have a stall available at the Parents Teacher Meetings in the coming terms. We have in the past held coffee mornings, inviting parents and guardians into school to meet and to discuss with financial advisors.



Liturgy Group: Once again Mr Roche will be establishing Year Group Liturgy Groups. Each new academic year Y7 have to elect members for the Liturgy group. These join the Y8 team to plan with events with the chaplain. This allows the boys to discuss the readings for the Mass, write prayers for the Mass and to participate in a particular way in certain events in the school year. The Chaplaincy badge "Fides Actio" and the Liturgy Badge are worn by the members.

The NEWMAN Masses: The entire College were able to celebrate Newman Day with two Masses celebrated simultaneously. One in the Parish church of Our Lady of Willesden and the other in the school Hall. Both Masses were planned by Mr Roche. Fr Jon celebrated the mass in Our Lady of Willesden with staff and pupils from y7 to y11, meanwhile Fr Tom OMI from Quex Rd celebrated Mass with y12, 13 and those pupils in the Pathway program. The 6th Former Mass was supervised by Ms Grace and the Form Tutors. We had a great organist, Helen Blake play the organ in church. Pupils had Mass booklets and were able to follow along and respond accordingly. Pupils read beautifully and clearly, the servers carried out their duties and the day was a delight. The Chaplain was MC at the parish event. As is tradition on this special day each pupil has received souvenir of the day – this year a Newman armband and the bar of Cadburys Dairy milk. Pupils went home earlier, they queued to be presented with their gifts. Staff members also received a bar of chocolate, an armband and a Newman prayer card if desired. 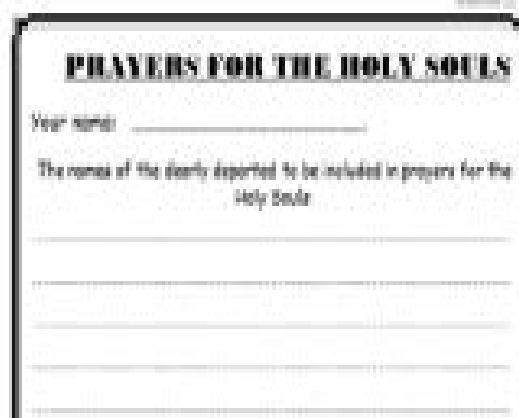

Income, as assessed by HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC), that does not exceed £16,190

- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit

Apply for free school meals

If you meet the criteria you can apply by:

- [Download the application form](#) (.pdf, 1.41MB) and return to Children's Team, Brent Customer Services, PO Box 1057, Wembley, Middlesex HA9 1HJ
- Asking your child's school for an application form which you can return to them or us
- Contacting Brent Customer Services Team on 0208 937 3110 for a paper copy of the application form which they will post to you.

The application form is only for a child or young person who attends a school or nursery in the London borough of Brent.

We will ask for proof of Child Benefit to be provided if this is your first application for free school meals. Eligibility for free school meals will not be backdated, so ensure you apply as soon as possible.

Please note that providing us with an email address or mobile number (or both) will help to ensure we can regularly inform and update you on the progress of your application.

Working Tax Credit exception

If you receive [Working Tax Credit](#) your children may be entitled to free school meals:

- for no longer than four weeks from the date you became unemployed (or reduced your working hours to less than 16 per week) and started receiving Working Tax Credit.

In this case you will need to provide evidence of your benefit. You need to make sure this information shows the date you became unemployed, or the date you reduced your hours, because free school meals are only available to parents on Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

If you have been unemployed and receiving Working Tax Credit for longer than four weeks, then your children are not entitled to free school meals.

If your Working Tax Credit stops and you begin receiving a different benefit that is one of the qualifying criteria listed above, you will continue to be eligible after the four-week period.

If you increase your hours or begin working and continue to receive Working Tax Credit your free school meal entitlement will stop.
