"A faith without bearing fruit in life, a faith that doesn't bear fruit in works is not faith," the pope said in a Mass homily, focusing on the day's first reading from the Book of James (2:14-24).

Wednesday. This year the Cafod appeal is to Walk against Hunger. Staff and Pupils were asked to take up something during Lent to help others. During April, Muslims will be starting their Month of Ramadan, where they will be also Fasting, Praying and Giving to Charities. the sacred space and value the hospitality offered. Mr Roche tries to make reference to Islam and other faiths in the teaching of the Catholic church.

Use words if you feel the need. Let God talk to you. We have showed pupils the Rosary and given them a way in to praying with beads. This allows those who

This, the start of the day prayer is a time to reflect and to hear a bible passage and to be guided in simple meditation on it. Pupils are able to use the Chapel freely thoughout the day in their free time. Some pupils are given special permission if they are in special circumstances, eg bereavement, seriously ill friend or relative etc.

thinking on. There is always a prayer and a scripture reading. Each Form Tutor is asked to spend one day with their Form using this extended Prayer and reflection. Daily, the school prayer is recited and prayer. Mr Roche has uses the School prayer as an example to all faiths rather than a solely Christian prayer, aiming to make the prayer inclusive. Pupils are asked to leave out bits that jar with their personal beliefs.
