

This is our 8th Year of Partnership work with Stuart Tannock and students from UCL Institute of Education, University College London. They are working with work with Mr King our London Citizens Coordinator and our Sixth Form Enrichment students to develop some community organising workshops.

In the lead up to the Mayoral Assembly on April 25th, the team will look at the struggle of Londoners to cope with the cost of living crisis, a hostile environment for our refugee and migrant neighbours, and a housing crisis that makes housing unaffordable and often uninhabitable. London Citizens believe that action leads to hope.

March 2020 was when the Foodbank started during lockdown. Four years later our volunteer Student and Staff team still continue to provide this service. We have seen an increased demand for our Foodbank in the past 6 months with numbers of families accessing the Foodbank continuing to grow. Reasons for accessing the Foodbank include low incomes resulting from debt, health conditions and issues with social security payments, universal credit, no recourse to public funds. We are reliant on donations to continue to offer this service. Recently, we have been given a generous donation from the Ministry Support Fund of the Society of the Sacred Heart England and Wales. This will enable us to continue to purchase stock when in demand items run low. Thanks to Sr Silvana RSCJ for her ongoing support.




The department has also a number of big events which have taken place in the last half term.



Weekly Masses: The school has continued to celebrate Mass on Fridays at 12:20 thanks to the generosity of the visiting clergy. Each term starts with a Year 11 Mass. The liturgy group's, Fides Actio team, plan and take on leading roles in the liturgies: reading, serving, drafting, and reading bidding prayers, operating the PPT as well as singing the hymns and responding to the prayers in Mass. We have introduced an offertory during the Mass and an introduction at the start of the Mass. This allows the pupils to know the theme of the Mass and to give them space to focus and refocus on what is about to happen. We would like to thank all the priests who are allowing us to continue

to live a sacramental life of the school. Thanks to Fr Tom, Fr Allan, Fr Albert and Fr Ruwan/Fr Kamal who continue being available for us in their parish life. We appreciate this. We have also this year started to link more with the tri-parishes of Harlesden (Our Lady of Willesden, Willesden Green (St Mary Mags) and Kensal Rise (the Transfiguration). Pupils (7, 8 & 9) are attending Masses in every Tuesday.

Prayers: Every week all staff and the Fides Actio groups receive a copy of the Prayer PowerPoint for the week. It contains a Reflection on a given topic for the week e.g. Lent. It also includes the Gospel for the upcoming Sunday and some questions to reflect upon. There is also a link to the 3-minute Retreat prayer site. These allow the pupils to have opportunity to prayer in their form time. The Rosary is recited after school in the chapel. Staff and pupils are welcome to attend and join in.

Geography Department


The Geography department were given the opportunity to visit the new HS2 site at Old Oak Common this term.



The London Eye February the 5th 2024





We started this trip exiting the London tube at Oxford Circus, a world renowned shopping district, which attracts shoppers from around our planet. After a short walk down Regents Street we entered Carnaby Street, a hotbed of fashion and culture, made infamous by the rock and roll stars of the swinging sixties. This exposed the students to some historic context of the old smoke, which helps us understand our current stature as a global powerhouse. Shortly after departing Carnaby Street we found in awe of the bright lights of Piccadilly Circus's advertising hoards.

We took a 400 yard stroll east and found ourselves transported in to the Far East. We entered Gerrard Street, our senses stimulated by the vibrant colours and fragrant smells of the orient. The streets decorated with beautiful hanging Chinese lanterns and the restaurant windows with hanging ducks. We were in the heart of London, but you could be forgiven for thinking you were in a bustling district of Guangzhou or Shanghai. We made our way towards the river, the historic lifeblood of this city. This helped the students understanding the varying historical architecture of London, it is almost like a tangible timeline of the cities evolving skyline.









At this point the Eye was in sight, we then waited eagerly in the queue ready to enter the pod.

It was a clear day so we were treated to an unforgettable vista of London. The students were able to identify London's landmarks from a completely different point of view. This vantage point allowed the students to better their geographical knowledge of London. 
Weaving together ideas with games and ensemble exercises, this group has been exploring their feelings of wonder when seeing the exhibitions at the museum.

The class were in awe by the history and culture rich pieces and loved visiting the different sections from their home countries.


The students will use different pieces from all over the world to influence and inspire them for their upcoming devising performance.


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
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ART AND DESIGN: GCSE SELF PORTRAIT PROJECT




FRIDA KAHLO PORTRAIT STUDIES.

This term has been a very successful term for the Chess Club and for Chess at NCC. Consisting of 2 teams of Brent schools champions, the first NCC grandmasters, a Jack Petchey winner and even more new faces and competitors.

Brent Schools Chess League Champions

The Brent schools chess league is a chess league tournament consisting of secondary and primary schools within the Brent area that compete against each other in Chess. Since Covid there have been no secondary school that have competed in the League. However with the help of Mr Lopes and Nick Toseland (Chess club co-ordinator at Ark Academy) we have managed to get more Secondary schools to participate in the tournament, notably Wembley High and other schools in future tournaments.

This time around NCC brought two teams down to the tournament, after playing 4 intense rounds of chess against some scarily challenging and difficult opposition, both our teams were placed in the top 3 teams in the schools chess league. NCC's KS4 team placed 1st in the whole tournament winning 20 out of 24 matches setting a new tournament record. As for the KS3 team they were placed 3rd after winning 15 out of 24 matches, The KS3 team secured third place by winning one extra match. The KS3 team were unfortunate as they could of came second if they weren't unlucky enough to be drawn against the KS4 team in the final round.







Easter in Spain



With the Easter holidays in Spain just around the corner, discovering the colourful culture and Easter traditions in Spain is an exciting thing to do in the Spring season.

Each year on Easter, Christians commemorate the fragments of Jesus' life, including the Passion of Christ and the Resurrection of Jesus. The last procession finalizes the holiday on Easter Sunday. This last event of the holiday is the most significant one, focusing on the Resurrection of Jesus.

Even non-Christians are familiar with the concept of Easter.

Easter bunnies or egg decorations are widely known all over the world, but do they have Easter eggs in Spain? And what about Spanish Pasos or Málaga's colourful parades? And how do they celebrate Easter in Spain? Let's dive into the essentials of Spanish Easter!

When is it celebrated in Spain?

The Holy Week and Easter are celebrated during the Spring season, slightly after the Spring equinox. It usually falls between the last weeks of March and the first days of April in Spain.

However, the exact dates can change each year. Since it must be calculated by the Gregorian calendar and the full moon, Easter is considered a moveable feast.



The Easter processions in Spain start with Palm Sunday, also known as Domingo de Ramos. It lasts the whole week and ends with Easter Sunday or Lunes de Pascua in Spanish.

How is it celebrated in Spain?

On Easter, the Resurrection of Jesus is commemorated with colourful events including parades with Pasos, and marches.

On Palm Sunday, the Holy Week begins with church rituals, processions, and distributions of sanctified palm leaves. Each day of the Semana Santa, parades take place all over Spain. The most spectacular Easter parades in Spain are organized in Andalucía, especially in Málaga and Sevilla.

During these Easter processions in Spain, people carry wooden arrangements called Pasos through the main streets. These Pasos are glorified sculpture-like icons portraying the Passion of Christ. In Málaga, the whole crowd marches down the streets with shiny Tronos. These Tronos are mostly palanquin-like structures painted in gold and various colour, adorned with candles and flowers. The religious brotherhoods are a big part of Semana Santa masses. You can come across a group of people wearing identical clothes, carrying Tronos or Pasos. They are usually dressed in shiny, colourful silk costumes with pointed headpieces. These are known as religious brotherhoods or Cofradía in Spanish.



Each autonomous community, even the city, hues a different holiday spirit around Easter. The most glamorous and monumental events mostly take place in Andalucia. Málaga and Seville rank as the best places to experience the Easter spirit. They're followed by Jerez de la Frontera, Granada, Castilla y Leon, Zamora, and Valladolid. The Easter Egg represents the resurrection of Christ and is mostly chosen as one of the attributes of the holiday. Hard-boiled eggs are distributed during the parades in Murcia, used as decorations, or even become a part of the best holiday dishes. Also, it may be surprising to see fewer Easter eggs and giant bunny decorations throughout the cities of Spain. The main reason is that Spanish Easter is a more religious and spiritual holiday rather than a festival. Almost all Spaniards join the gatherings and events, however, more likely to send prayers and commemorate Christ.

Traditional Easter Dishes in Spain

The final day of the Semana Santa, Easter Sunday in Spain, is mostly spent with families and loved ones. In some regions of Spain, people participate in Easter masses in the mornings. Then, they meet at the table upon return to enjoy the traditional Easter meals, especially the famous Easter cake called Mona de Pascua.

The most traditional Easter foods in Spain are the famous Easter eggs, **Mona de Pascuas**, **Torrijas**, and **Bueñuelos**. But also, there are subsidiary additional dishes such as the Sopa de Ajo, or Flores Fritas de Semana Santa.

The famous chocolate Easter egg is called Huevos de Pascua in Spain. It is one of the most essential desserts of the holiday. These egg-shaped chocolates are made with specific molds and filled with sweets and candies.

Bueñelos are deep-fried bite-size doughnuts with irregular shapes. Not only on Easter but Bueñelos are also essential dishes for other holidays in Spain, especially in Valencia.

Sopa de Ajo is also a famous garlic soup, usually eaten on the morning of Good Friday during Easter Week in Spain. The soup is made with chicken stock, paprika, and eggs on some occasions. It's even tastier when served with croutons.
 Torrijas are also another Easter dish placed on the table during the Semana Santa. They are pretty similar to French toast, but only the Spanish version of it. There are a few differences, such as the frying method or ingredients. In some regions of Spain, such as Seville, people use wine instead of milk, which creates a remarkable difference.

Here is the most aesthetic dish of the season: **Flores Fritas de Semana Santa**. It is an amazing reputation in Castilla y Leon and bears a significant resemblance to Calatrava Cross. It's also one of the most delicious snacks to taste during Easter in Spain.

Mona de Pascua is a must-have at Easter dinners. This is the traditional easter cake, mostly famous around Catalonia, Valencia, and Murcia. **Mona de Pascuas** mostly are made as ring-shaped sweet bread decorated with whole eggs on top or in the middle. There are variations of it, in some places it might be covered in chocolate, sprinkles, or candies.

Whether you are a catholic or not, visiting Spain during Easter is an interesting and cultural experience that you should live if you have the chance.

HOW DO THEY CELEBRATE INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY IN FRANCE?

A story of women

It all began in the early 20th century, with female workers from all countries started demanding better working conditions and the right to vote. It became a global tradition after the Second World War, expanded with the feminist




movements of the 1970s, and was officially recognised by France in 1982.

International Women's Day in France is a major celebration, and people throughout the country observe this holiday. Currently, one of the biggest issues being demonstrated against in France **is the wage gap** that women experience in the workplace. In addition to demonstrations, women often receive gifts or special deals for International Women's Day. These include things like bouquets of flowers, chocolate, and beauty-related products.

Why is this such an important day?

It's because we all know that there is still a great deal of inequality between men and women. Does it seem right to you that men are paid more than their female colleagues? Moreover, women continue to be in a minority in politics and in management posts. Finally, in many countries women are victims of violence and discrimination. It is therefore no accident that the theme selected in the latest years is 'Women in the Changing World of Work: **Planet 50-50 by 2030.**'



The Tour de France- "the J-1 women"

A notable demonstration of women's fight for equality in France is the Tour de France. In particular, there's a group of women who have been riding the entire Tour de France by the name *Donnons des Elles au Vélo Jour -1*, which means "Let the girls ride the day before.", also known with the abbreviation "*the J-1 women*"

Over time, they have gained a following across social media and the French media, as well as backing from one of

the big supporters of women's cycling, automobile manufacturer ŠKODA.



The point of their effort is to make the sport's organisers and the wider work aware of the absence of a women's Tour, the race having undertaken the gruelling challenge of competing the Tour route <u>within the same three</u> weeks as the professional men.

Donnons des Elles au Vélo Jour -1 is supported by ŠKODA, which is doing its bit to put right the gender imbalance in

cycling, and to encourage more women in the UK to ride.

They also gained a high-profile British advocate as <u>Dame Sarah Storey</u>, the 14-time Paralympic gold medallist in cycling and swimming, joined the peloton. Storey was impressed by the positivity of this French team as they make a stand for greater equality in cycling.

"The great and unique thing about the J-1 women – alongside making the point to themselves and everybody else – is that they are showing that it is a possibility," she said. "They let their legs do the talking and they do it with grace. It was that grace that really struck me; it wasn't a big angry protest ride or a campaign. It is more, 'This is what we are doing and this is what we would like to happen' – and it is fabulous."






In J-1, there is **no yellow jersey and there is no winner. The goal is to work as one towards equality**. As Storey rode with the team from La Baule on the Atlantic coast to the Breton town of Sarzeau, she was moved by the team's unity. "The women are all hugely supportive of each other and all aware of each other's strengths and weaknesses, so they ride as a unit to get from A to B in the most economical and efficient way and have a laugh doing it," she said. "Having a group ride like that is going to make a hard, hard journey easier. If you are not getting on and can't gel as a unit on the road, then it will take a lot longer. They are a fabulous group of girls, they are doing it with such grace as it is not an easy thing to point out inequality."

Equality investment

One question Storey is asked repeatedly is what would she do if she was the president of cycling's global governing body, the UCI. Her answer is both emphatic and an endorsement of J-1's ambitions.

"I would look at making an investment from what we know the UCI has in reserve. I wouldn't just make it in women's cycling but in all different parts of cycling because I am also a paracyclist and there are so many inequalities with that as well. "I would make the investment and say, 'Let's invest in each [area]' – because it might not be a lucrative thing now but you have to speculate to accumulate "Although it might cost more now, because you are trying to build something, **I would create equality in everything.** "I would pay for the coverage, pay for

everything and make it completely equal. We would see it as a major statement in cycling [and] to the whole world."



The admission of women to complete equality would be the surest mark of civilisation; it would double the intellectual capacity of the human race and its potential for happiness.





If you meet the criteria you can apply by:

Asking your child's school for an application form which you can return to them or us
Contacting Brent Customer Services Team on 0208 937 3110 for a paper copy of the application form which they will post to you.

The application form is only for a child or young person who attends a school or nursery in the London borough of Brent.

We will ask for proof of Child Benefit to be provided if this is your first application for free school meals. Eligibility for free school meals will not be backdated, so ensure you apply as soon as possible.

Please note that providing us with an email address or mobile number (or both) will help to ensure we can regularly inform and update you on the progress of your application.

Working Tax Credit exception

If you receive <u>Working Tax Credit</u> your children may be entitled to free school meals: •for no longer than four weeks from the date you became unemployed (or reduced your working hours to less than 16 per week) and started receiving Working Tax Credit. In this case you will need to provide evidence of your benefit. You need to make sure this information shows the date you became unemployed, or the date you reduced your hours, because free school meals are only available to parents on Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

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If you have been unemployed and receiving Working Tax Credit for longer than four weeks, then your children are not entitled to free school meals.

If your Working Tax Credit stops and you begin receiving a different benefit that is one of the qualifying criteria listed above, you will continue to be eligible after the four-week period. If you increase your hours or begin working and continue to receive Working Tax Credit your free school meal entitlement will stop.
