




Your son is enrolled in a reading package designed to support his choice of reading material and keep track of his reading progress. The online programme means pupils at NCC can read books, log into a website and take quizzes testing their knowledge of the books they have read and new words they might have learnt. The LRC has hundreds of books to quiz.

Each pupils is also allocated a reading target, pupils can **WIN** points by reading books and answering quizzes correctly. If your son beats his target he will receive a certificate and a small prize in half termly assemblies. There are also prizes for reading 10,000, 30,000 and 50,000 words.


In addition, as parents you can track your son's reading by using the Home Connect option. You can also sign up for email updates which mean that you will receive a notification every time your son reads a book and completes a quiz. You can follow the link on the school's website or visit the following webpage to login: https://Ukhosted7.renlearn.co.uk/1895176/HomeConnect



The website will show you:

- The percentage of correct answers your son is getting when he answers quiz questions on books he has read (target: 85%)
- The number of points your son has achieved and his points target.
- The level of book your son is reading
- Your son's current reading certificate.
- All the books your son has read

This is a fantastic way to get more involved with your son's reading. You will be receiving log in details with your son's next Assessment Update.



Whole School Read



For the second year running Newman Catholic College has run an innovative cross-curricular reading project which we call the 'Whole School Read'. Last year we read the wildly popular adventure story 'Wild Boy' and celebrated with a visit from the book's author Rob Lloyd-Jones.

This year we chose a completely different book with very different themes, the poetically written 'Keeper' by Mal Peet is a novel about a South American World Cup winning goal keeper who is trained by a phantom ghost on a mission to escape a mysterious captor. The book is part ghost story but its central themes of identity, decision making and, of course, football had pupils in Years 7-9 gripped.

All the pupils in Key Stage Three have just completed a creative writing project with two spoken words artists from Student of Life called Breis and Karl Nova. All the pupils took part in a two hour hip-hop literacy workshop which blended music, word play and poetry. They all write their own poems considered who has influenced them and helped shape their personalities. Taking inspiration from 'Keeper' we heard some amazingly heartfelt poems dedicated to parents, grandparents, aunts and older siblings.

The English Team chose one pupil in each class to perform their piece at our annual Celebration of Reading. These pupils worked intensively with Breis and Karl for two days to polish their work and get their performance ready.

As part of the project we also sent Breis and Karl into two local primary schools to work with primary pupils so they could experience something of what life at NCC is like and the opportunities available. Both primary schools attended our Celebration of Reading in which Breis shared a powerful story about how books have changed his life; every pupil in Key stage 3 was given a free book to read over the summer and the pupils performed their spectacular poems.

The Celebration was a wonderful event which will hopefully continue to inspire a community







Whole School Read 2017




















Bletchley Park - the home of British codebreaking

Alongside visiting the historical site and its extensive grounds, the boys took part in an exciting workshop on code breaking, led and organised by the Educational team at Bletchley Park. They all had a chance to use an original Enigma machine, to both encipher and decipher secret messages. The boys enjoyed their day tremendously and staff at the venue complemented them on both their Mathematical ability and exemplary behaviour.

Our year 8 set 1 and 2 boys have been given the opportunity to show off their understanding of science using creative skills and win some amazing prizes on the way.

The Linnean Society is holding the competition for 8 different schools with at least 500 students taking place.

In this instance the competition has been developed around the topic of ecosystems and the main aim is to be accessible for KS3 students of different abilities. Our boys have taken the competition very seriously and have shown an excellent ability to think outside the box.

As the students can enter the competition using a variety of media (e.g. video, blog, poem or short story) our boys have a real opportunity to excel as it plays into their talents.

Their hard work and dedication will pay off and we hope they will win many prizes.

Year 8 Visit the Science Museum

Last Wednesday the 15th of June all of the year 8 students went to the Science Museum.

It was a great opportunity to bring the KS3 curriculum to our daily life.


When we arrived we were split into two teams; Blue and Red. We played in different places over the campus such as:

The Level 3 Extended Diploma in Performing Arts students rounded off their time at Newman Catholic College with a full scale production of Nigerian playwright Ola Rotimi's *The Gods Are Not to Blame*. Rotimi's play is a reimagining of Sophocles Oedipus Rex, set in a traditional Yoruba society.

This was a physically and intellectually demanding piece as it required students to understand and apply ancient Greek theatrical conventions while embodying the vibrancy, energy and humour of Rotimi's text. Yet if any group of young performers were able to take on such a challenge, it was this one.



This is a cohort whose dynamism and zest for life could be felt throughout the school. Amos Ashe gave a virtuoso interpretation of Odewale- Rotimi's Oedipus- a role which this complex play hinged on and a role which was created with a consummate performer in mind. Amos' success is a credit to his natural talent and charisma but also his maturity, dedication and reliability. The production also showcased the skilful ensemble work the Extended Diploma students have achieved over the past two years. Such collaboration is not an easy feat and demonstrates the groups' mutual respect and camaraderie. Each performer delivered moving, funny, engaging and shocking moments and it is impossible to single all these out. It would however be remiss not to mention Jude Dugbazah whose seemingly effortless ability to flip from one multilayered character to another delighted his audience. There were many occasions where Jude received spontaneous applause- something the majority of West End performers can only imagine. Every student on this course who applied to university this year has comfortably secured a place. We wish them every success and look forward to seeing what they achieve in the next stage of their careers.

As part of their Acting Skills unit, the BTEC Level 2 First Award in Performing Arts 6th Form 'Fast-track' students performed scenes from playwrights who dominated the stages of Europe and the United States in the 19th and 20th centuries: August Strindberg, Federico Garcia Lorca and Arthur Miller.

While many of the Fast-track students speak three, four, five or more languages, English is not the language most will speak at home. It is a testament to these students' intellectual curiosity and perceptiveness that they were able to sensitively interpret a Spanish and a Swedish play from a different era translated into English and to make them their own. Most of the Fast-track students had limited experience of the performing arts prior to commencing the Level 2 Award and this qualification has pushed them to understand and apply drama theory and face audiences in a very short period of time. Aside from the indisputable skills in English language communication, public speaking, collaboration and problem solving that this course has afforded these students, as a department we very much hope that this experience will engender a lifelong love of the theatre for many of them.
