

Accompanied by head of music Dan Playford and Connor Reeves, the group started the Camino Walk in Sarria.

The Camino de Santiago (the

Way of St James) is a large network of ancient pilgrim routes across Europe which comes together at the tomb of St James in Santiago de Compostela in north-west Spain.

As well as plenty of walking, which got harder as the days wore on, the boys enjoyed football and swimming along the way, stay-

ing in hostels and enjoying good food.

At the end of their trip they attended a pilgrim's mass.

Mr Playford said: "The last two days were the real challenge, the boys were now very tired, their legs were aching and their mo-

"Overall a very memorable experience and one I expect the boys to remember for years to

























Your son is enrolled in a reading package designed to support his choice of reading material and keep track of his reading progress. The online programme means pupils at NCC can read books, log into a website and take quizzes testing their knowledge of the books they have read and new words they might have learnt. The LRC has hundreds of books to quiz.

Each pupils is also allocated a reading target, pupils can **WIN** points by reading books and answering quizzes correctly. If your son beats his target he will receive a certificate and a small prize in half termly assemblies. There are also prizes for reading 10,000, 30,000 and 50,000 words.

In addition, as parents you can track your son's reading by using the Home Connect option. You can also sign up for email updates which mean that you will receive a notification every time your son reads a book and completes a quiz. The website will show you:

- The percentage of correct answers your son is getting when he answers quiz questions on books he has read (target: 85%)
- The number of points your son has achieved and his points target.
- The level of book your son is reading
- Your son's current reading certificate.
- All the books your son has read

This is a fantastic way to get more involved with your son's reading. You will be receiving log in details with your son's next Assessment Update.

Premier League reading stars - PLRS

Once again a new season began in October 2015. An elite force (those who required progress) of year 7 and 8 learners laced up their boots and dusted their books; ready to become Premiership Reading Stars!

In its second year and third cohort, Reading stars has become a highly motivational tool for increasing reading activity in KS3; ensuring learners are increasing their reading levels. The cohorts are challenged and stretched to not only read in front of their peers but also comment on the effects of language and the authors use of structure; two key skills they will develop and rely on to get them those final GCSE grades in year 11. This process allows them to have a shared experience of reading and comprehension as well as have fun discussing interesting topics and themes arising from the vast reading material at NCC and PLRS.

This season we continued the tradition of fun warm up activities involving penalty shoot outs in the class room (a soft football), reading extracts from books and short stories, discussing reading habits, reading barriers, competitions, and analysing reading skills such as Inference and deduction. The season has ended well and we will be celebrating success by awarding trophies for 'best attendee'; 'Most improved reader' and 'Best contributions'.

Creative Geniuses

The English Department is committed to making sure every pupil has access to a Library during the school holidays. We have partnered up with Harlesden Library to ensure that all pupils have a Brent Library card and can access library services which our own space cannot offer.

As part of this programme every pupil in Year 7 and 8 has visited Harlesden Library, borrowed books and taken part in a performance poetry workshop with famous poet and performer Jared Louche.

The pupils have been experimenting with story-telling and hearing some of Jared's tall tales as well as creating their own imagery and creative sentences.

We hope that Jared will now come to school to work with pupils and encourage them to be even more creative.









OPEN EVENING

During the Open Evening the Science department prepared a lot of activities for both parents and students. There were different stations where students and Science teachers were showing different experiments related to Biology, Chemistry and Physics. We had human body models, experiments about convection, conduction and radiation, a recreation of fireworks.....

The top attraction was the "bubble explosion". We were using methane to create bubbles. Students and parents put some of the bubbles on their hands. When we set the bubbles on fire... a huge but harmless explosion took place! Everyone loved it; it was very exciting to see how everybody wanted to repeat the experiment!

While experiments were happening, Science staff had the opportunity to have a nice conversation with parents sharing with them the results from last year and informing them about ongoing activities in the Science department.



What is a science club?

Newman Catholic College has a proud history in providing students with out-of-school-hours educational activities. The science department offers pupils the chance to do science-related activities that extend and enhance the science they experience in the classroom. We use the opportunity to explore areas of science not covered by the curriculum and to give the club members plenty of opportunities to do practical science.

A science club session typically lasts for about 45 minutes. In this time, the pupils might complete a challenge, plan a science project or have a special scientific visitor.

The Science Department is open to all students from year 7 to year 13s, and since the start we have had an excellent turn up.

The main goal of the science club is to provide children with a safe, fun learning environment and enriching their scientific skill set by:

- Practicing skills needed in science.
- Increase opportunity to develop and practice thinking, speaking and listening skills.
- Opportunities to experience a wider range of science topics, hence broadening their enthusiasm for science.





CREST is a UK award scheme that recognises success, and enables students to build their skills and demonstrate personal achievement in project work. It offers young people the opportunity to take ownership of their projects and choose to undertake them in areas they enjoy or see as relevant.

During the last 6 months we have had 5 year 11 students research, plan and construct a report on HIV-2 and its decent titled "HIV-2 descended from SIVsmm". Our students made a wide variety of discoveries and were doing their research from resources such as university research papers. This project allowed our students to work independently and also gave them an awareness of how to prepare reports when they progress into third level education.

On the evening of September 24th, Twyford CofE School hosted a celebratory evening where our students presented their project work and findings to a selection of different students, lecturers and teachers. The boys showed a great understanding of their research and took pride in their work.

The boys received the Silver Crest Award which is a fantastic achievement for them, the school and the Brent Community


THE TOMORROW PROJECT

Many are showing huge promise and a growing appreciation of the relationship between performer and audience. It will be exciting to witness these students share their newly honed talents.

NW10 Hearbeats will also enable the Year 11 performance students to understand the many processes necessary to put on a large production and the personal management skills that this entails. The event will offer our students the understanding and confidence to take full ownership of a second production in February.









Fast-track

The BTEC First Award Fast-track students will shortly be tackling scenes from August Strindberg's *Miss Julie* and Federico Garcia Lorca's *The House of Bernarda Alba* as part of their *Acting Skills* unit. These scenes will prove challenging as both plays were written and set in traditional European societies well over a hundred years ago. We are confident that the fast-track will produce some arresting and thought-provoking interpretations of these scenes as this group share a wealth of languages and experiences of different cultures as well as a strong worth ethic.

Macbeth

Here our BTEC Extended Diploma shared their performance skills with Years 10 and 11 to support their GCSE syllabus by bringing key scenes from *Macbeth* to life.

The Extended Diploma students' unit Classical Theatre Performance required them to balance an appreciation of the original performance conditions and an accurate interpretation of Shakespeare's text with a style that would engage their modern audience. It was a credit both to the performers and indeed the audience that the performance was watched intently and insightful questions were asked in the question and answer sessions that followed each performance.

The next classical theatre performance will be based on *Oedipus*. The Extended Diploma students will combine dance and music with Greek theatre skills in a truly authentic adaptation of this ancient text.









No Pens Wednesday was an outstanding success in the Geography Department. Each year group took part in creating 3D Lego models. Each group was given a sheet with data about the ten largest cities in 1900, 1950 and 2012.

Using a base map each group had to locate the cities and then construct a graph using Lego. We used a scale of one square block to represent one million people. Students then used the support sheet to begin to describe the geographical distribution of the cities.

We wanted students to consider the changing pattern of urbanisation, and as a result begin to consider some of the contributing factors in a fun and creative way. It was also an opportunity to begin to develop students' ability to describe patterns.

Student feedback was extremely positive and all groups were highly motivated. More creative work is planned for next term.







First World War Battleground Tour to France

I recently had the opportunity to attend the First World War Battleground tour from Legacy 110 with 2 lucky students, Kwaku and Gagini who are studying History, We went to see at first hand some of the famous battlegrounds and cemeteries from the First World War. This tour was aimed to boost the research and communication skills of the students, seeing the devastating effects of the First World War; and had the opportunity to prepare a project on their local solider. Kwaku and Gagini also had the opportunity to handle artefacts from the period.

The defining moment for me on this entire tour was on the last day visiting the Langemarck Cemetery which was famously visited by Adolf Hitler. This was so significant for me due to the reaction from some of the Jewish students who were on the tour with us. When they found out from the tour guide, that Hitler visited this site and stood in a specific place in the cemetery, they instantly moved and decided that they no longer wanted to take part in this part of the tour. This was astounding to me because it still showed even 75 years later, the negative effect Adolf Hitler still has on people and how he still remains one of the most controversial figures in history.

A few questions I asked myself after the tour. Were the days demanding? Yes. Was it a lot of information to take in? Yes. Would I recommend people to go on this tour? Yes. Was it an amazing experience? Yes. Was it worth it? Yes. Was it not one of the best experiences of my life? Yes. Would I go again? Yes, I would not hesitate.






Les garçons" at Newman



Pastry

225g plain flour

60g butter/lard in small pieces

- ½ teaspoon turmeric powder
- ¾ tablespoon cold water
- 1/4 teaspoon curry powder

Filling

225g mince

1 finely chopped onion

2-3 cloves garlic

½ tablespoon curry powder

¼ teaspoon turmeric powder

Salt and pepper

1/4 teaspoon chilli powder

50g breadcrumbs

50ml beef or veg stock





Method


No space for full method here but basically....

For filling: Fry onion in some oil, after a few minutes add garlic, cook until translucent, then add mince and brown. Add all spices. Add stock and bread crumbs. Simmer. Add a splash of water if too dry. If you get stuck, just look at the pictures.



Demand soars for Tricycle Theatre's refugee classes

A THEATRE that runs drama workshops for teenage refugees says it has seen demand soar as the migrant crisis has worsened.

The Tricycle Theatre in Kilburn is running sessions for young migrants and asylum seekers who have just arrived in London. Since July, the number of classes in the project, Minding the Gap, has risen from seven to 11 a week, with about 25 children in each group.

Project manager Kate Young said that in the past year she had seen an increase in the number of people from Syria, with migrants from Afghanistan and Eritrea also making up a big proportion of intakes. In Brent, the theatre's host borough, children who

have just arrived from abroad are educated in separate classes before they join other pupils at their schools.

The drama workshops support their English classes and give them a chance to recount their experiences. They make short movies, working with a professional playwright and film crew.

Ms Young said: "What is so lovely is seeing the students perform on stage at the end of the programme. We offer something schools don't often have the opportunity to offer." Since it began 10 years ago, more than 1,000 young people have passed through the scheme. It is partly council-funded and Ms Young said it has had to seek more outside donations as it has grown.

Oana Arotaritei, a learning support assistant at Newman Catholic College in Willesden, said: "What they do here is a miracle. It improves communication and makes students feel secure." A 16-year-old girl from India who attends the college said: "We've

done drama and drawing and made puppet dragons."



Apply for free school meals

If you meet the criteria you can apply by:

- •<u>Download the application form</u> (.pdf, 1.41MB) and return to Children's Team, Brent Customer Services, PO Box 1057, Wembley, Middlesex HA9 1HJ
- •Asking your child's school for an application form which you can return to them or us
- •Contacting Brent Customer Services Team on 0208 937 3110 for a paper copy of the application form which they will post to you.

The application form is only for a child or young person who attends a school or nursery in the London borough of Brent.

We will ask for proof of Child Benefit to be provided if this is your first application for free school meals. Eligibility for free school meals will not be backdated, so ensure you apply as soon as possible.

Please note that providing us with an email address or mobile number (or both) will help to ensure we can regularly inform and update you on the progress of your application.

Working Tax Credit exception

If you receive Working Tax Credit your children may be entitled to free school meals:

•for no longer than four weeks from the date you became unemployed (or reduced your working hours to less than 16 per week) and started receiving Working Tax Credit.

In this case you will need to provide evidence of your benefit. You need to make sure this information shows the date you became unemployed, or the date you reduced your hours, because free school meals are only available to parents on Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

If you have been unemployed and receiving Working Tax Credit for longer than four weeks, then your children are not entitled to free school meals.

If your Working Tax Credit stops and you begin receiving a different benefit that is one of the qualifying criteria listed above, you will continue to be eligible after the four-week period. If you increase your hours or begin working and continue to receive Working Tax Credit your free school meal entitlement will stop.

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THE PREVENT STRATEGY Working in partnership with our Parents and the Police Service

What is the Prevent strategy?

Prevent is a government strategy designed to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorist or extremist causes.

The Prevent strategy covers all types of terrorism and extremism, including the extreme right wing, violent groups and other causes.

How does the Prevent strategy apply to schools?

From July 2015 all schools (as well as other organisations) have a duty to safeguard children from radicalisation and extremism.

This means we have a responsibility to protect children from extremist and violent views the same way we protect them from drugs or gang violence. Importantly, we can provide a safe place for pupils to discuss these issues so they better understand how to protect themselves.

KEY TERMS:

- •Extremism vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values such as democracy, the rule of law and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs.
- •Ideology a set of beliefs.
- •**Terrorism** a violent action against people or property, designed to create fear and advance a political, religious or ideological cause.
- •Radicalisation the process by which a person comes to support extremism and terrorism.

What does this mean in practice?

Many of the things we already do in school to help children become positive, happy members of society also contribute to the Prevent strategy. These include:

- Exploring other cultures and religions and promoting diversity
- •Challenging prejudices and racist comments
- •Developing critical thinking skills and a strong, positive self-identity
- Promoting the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of pupils, as well as British values such as democracy

We will also protect children from the risk of radicalisation, for example by using filters on the internet to make sure they cannot access extremist and terrorist material, or by vetting visitors who come into school to work with pupils.

NCC e-safety user agreement:

- •Students use the school digital technology systems in accordance with the
- Student Acceptable Use Agreement.
- •The internet is for research: avoid plagiarism.
- •Report abuse, misuse or access to inappropriate materials to staff immediately (be it at school, or school-relevant online) We have a zero tolerance on all types of bullying, including cyber bullying.
- •The school's E-Safety Policy covers their actions out of school, including appropriate use of all social media.
- •All online actions should respect the Newman Values.

Frequently Asked Questions

How does Prevent relate to British values?

Schools have been required to promote British values since 2014, and this will continue to be part of our response to the Prevent strategy.

British values include:

- Democracy
- The rule of law
- •Individual liberty and mutual respect
- Tolerance of different faiths and beliefs

Our own "Newman Values" reflect each of these main categories, as well as reflecting our Catholic ethos.

Isn't my child too young to learn about extremism?

The Prevent strategy is not just about discussing extremism itself, which may not be appropriate for younger children. It is also about teaching children values such as tolerance and mutual respect. The school will make sure any discussions are suitable for the age and maturity of the children involved.

Is extremism really a risk in our area?

Extremism can take many forms, including political, religious and misogynistic extremism. Some of these may be a bigger threat in our area than others.

We will give children the skills to protect them from any extremist views they may encounter, now or later in their lives.

Newman Values

- •We are all **responsible for our own actions** and the impact they have upon others.
- •We **respect the right of others** to learn and are prepared to learn ourselves.
- •We actively **contribute to the life of the school** and the wider community.
- •We respect the faiths, cultures and values of others in our community.
- •We recognise that the purpose of **rules and laws are for the good of everyone.**
- •We treat others as we would like to be treated.
- •We actively encourage the use of the English language at all times


